The Application of John Muncie of the County of Bladen, State of North Carolina, sets forth that he, the said John Muncie, was regularly enlisted and served, during the late war between the States, in the Confederate States army or navy, as follows:

That he served honorably during the war in said army (or navy), and was true and loyal to the government of the Confederate States to the end of the war, and that he has borne a good character ever since; that he is 78 years of age; that he is not married; that he is of fair complexion, 5 1/2 feet in height, and is by occupation a farmer; that his nearest relative is Thomas S. Muncie whose post-office is Dublin N. C.; that because of his age and feeble health he, the said John Muncie, is unable to provide for and support himself, and, therefore, he makes this his application for admission into the "Soldiers' Home"; that he is a person of sobriety and good habits, and, if admitted as an inmate to said Home, he hereby agrees, upon pains of expulsion, to abide

by and obey all the rules and regulations made by the proper authorities of the Home for its government, and that he will perform all duties required of him and obey all lawful orders of the officers of the said Home.
