THURSDAY, September 30th, 1886.

Invited A. W. Beck, a visiting minister, to a seat.

J. M. Hamlin offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

That the Association meet at the stand each day at 9:30 o'clock for devotional exercises; at ten enter on business; eleven, adjourn for preaching; 1:30, p. m., resume business, and adjourn at will.

W. P. Southern offered the following:

RESOLVED, That we appoint a committee on Conventional Missions. Adopted.

On motion, adjourned until 9:30 to-morrow. Prayer by H. Manley.

FRIDAY, October 1st, 1886.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Engaged in devotional exercises for 30 minutes, conducted by the Moderator. Resumed business. Called on Committee on arrangements to report. Submitted the minute of last year as their report. Adopted.

Committee on Preaching reported that Elder G. H. Church preach at 11 o'clock.

Committee on Foreign Missions granted until to morrow 10:30 o'clock to report.

Committee on Temperance reported. After remarks by S. W. Hamilton and W. P. Southern, the hour arrived for preaching.

Elder G. H. Church preached. Text: Luke 8:11-15. Prayer by Elder J. H. Duckworth.

Intermission for one hour-

EVENING SESSION.

Reassembled. Prayer by Elder G. W. Brooks. The Moderator in the Chair.

Resumed the discussion of the report on Temperance. After remarks by Elder G. H. Church, J. W. Orr, V. M. Goodson and H. C. Osborne, the report was adopted as follows:

Your committee on Temperance submit the following: Those best informed upon the subject, say that within the United States there are 50,000 deaths annually caused by intemperance, and that there are \$400.000.000 expended in the traffic of intoxicants, 25.000 wives made widows, 100,000 children made orphans. To counteract this gigantic evil with all its evil tendencies, three States have incorporated Prohibition in their Constitutions, nine teen States have partial Prohibition in the form of local option laws, fourteen States have passed laws requiring the study of the Physiological effects of intoxicants to be taught in the public schools. The anti-saloon convention met in Chicago two weeks ago, with a delegation of 300 of the most influential men in fourteen states, and passed strong resolutions in favor of temperance. The Southern Baptist Convention at its last meeting took a strong and decided stand in favor of the cause. We are glad to learn that the Baptists are taking the lead in the cause of temperance. We believe that within a very short time all Christians will be united on this subject, and will vote for no man for any office who is not strictly a temperance man.

Home Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention. This includes all the destitution in the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention and therefore brings us under obligation to give the gospel to the colored man of the South and to the red man of the forest, and also to the Foreigner whom the Lord is sending to our shores. We believe that we are under greater obligation to give the gospel to the Indians than any other race of people, because we have dispossessed them of their hunting grounds, on which we have built our dwellings and our churches. Therefore let us give of our means to help on the worthy cause.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

Breva d High School was founded at Brevard July 24, 1886. The Board of Trustees employed Prof. J. H. Hamilton, of Bingham High School, as principal, who opened the school August 9.

The first Womans Missionary society formed in this Association was organized in Brevard church, May 15th. Mrs. T. N. Cooper was elected President. Mrs. Ella T. Duckworth Secretary. Contribution for present quarter was \$5.00.

Elder G. H. Church was settled in the Pastorate at Brevard, Dec. 1st, 1885. Elder Harrison Manly united with Cathey's Creek church September 18th. W. R. Galloway, a member of Macedonia church, departed this life Septem-

w. R. Ganoway, a member of Macedonia church, departed this life September 21st, in the 69th year of his age. He professed faith in Christ and united with Macedonia church in early life. He leaves a large train of relatives and friends to mourn his loss.

The report on Conventional Missions was then adopted as fol-

Your committee on Conventional Missions having examined the report of the Boards of the Western Baptist Convention for last year, and from what information we have been able to gather of the present years work, report great progress. The Mission Board of the Convention is now locating good men at the towns and railroad centers in Western N. C., and also building good houses of worship. For the last two years our Boards have had under their supervision more than twenty Missionaries, who, with the aid of brother Carter as General Missionary, have been able to more fully unite the Baptist brotherhood of Western North Carolina. And we are beginning to feel that the Western Raptist Convention is our Convention, and the Boards all our Boards, and all their interests our interests. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That this, the Transylvania Association, do more heartily cooperate with the workings of the Western Baptist Convention.

The following resolution, by J. M. Hamlin, was adopted.

RESOLVED, That this Association be divided into three divisions, and that Union meetings of the churches be held in one, on each fifth Sunday, except last Sunday in July, the time of annual meeting Sunday School Convention. That a committee be appointed to make the division and appoint the first meeting.

Committee on Foreign Missions reported. Remarks by W. P. Southern and Elder G. H. Church, after which took up a collection for the same, amounting to \$6.85. The report was then adopted as follows:

The nineteen churches represented in this meeting, with a membership of 1400, have contributed for Foreign Missions, during the past year, \$19.20, or 1½ cts. per capita. The Baptists for 1885, gave 49 cts. per capita; Congregational, \$1.66; Presbyterian, \$1.16; M. E. church, 21 cts. As a denomination we are far behind in this important work, and as an association we scarcely deserve the name of Missionary Baptists. The criminal indifference is wholly attribitable to a want of a deeper and more enlightened piety. It is quite probable that 19-20ths of the Baptists in this country are indulging the false hope that some of the heathen will be saved without the gospel.

We would therefore urge our pastors to preach on and take collections for the work on Sunday the 7th day of November, this being the day set apart by the Mission Board of Great Brittain and America for special prayer throughout the world in behalf of Foreign Missions. We further recommend the distribution of Mission tracts and books, and especially the circulation of the "Foreign Mission Journal." We have the greatest encouragement possible to obey the last command of our blessed Master. In 1793 Carey went to India to tell the heathen of Jesus. Now there are in India some five hundred thousand souls who delight to say of Jesus, "My Lord and my God." In 1814 the Baptists of the United States organized to support the first Missionary, the immortal Judson. To-day we have some one hundred thousand converts in heathen lands. How vast the field yet unoccupied. There are upwards of

300,000,000 souls who have never heard of Jesus. In Africa alone it is estimated that 720 die every hour, of whom only two have heard the gospel.

EVENING SESSION.

Reassembled. The Moderator in the chair.
Invited Elder Joseph E. Carter, Editor "Western N. C. Baptist." and General Agent Western Convention, to a seat.

Invited Prof. J. H. Hamilton, of Brevard High School, to a seat. Committee on Education reported. Remarks by C. M. Gallamore, R. W. Lee. Elder's Joseph E. Carter, J. H. Duckworth and Prof. J. H. Hamilton.

On motion the report was adopted as follows:

Your committee on education beg leave to report that in their judgement the cause of education is steadily growing in favor within the bounds of this Association. Evidence is seen in the fact that better school houses for the accommodation of our common schools are building in various localities. More enlightened teachers are demanded in the schools. Some localities are undertaking to extend their public terms into longer terms by individual contribution. Carson's Creek under the supervision of C. O. Hilder and Little River with C. M. Gallamore have good schools to whom we wish to offer encouragement. The church at Enon are laying a broad foundation for a school of grade and character. For the last two years the brethren have been discussing the feasibility of establishing a proprietory school in our midst. After several meetings discussing thoroughly the practicability of such an enterprise, a school has been organized at Brevard under the control of a large Board of Trustees, representing the interests of every section of our Association and is presided over by Prof. J. H. Hamilton, of the Bingham High School, and the University State Normal School of Nashville, Tennessee, who is prepared to do good and efficient work. We again commend Judson College as worthy the patronage of our Association, regarding as we do our own schools as feeders of this. The work done there in the way of educating the ministry meets our warmest commendation. In this work particularly, as well as the general work of education done by the College, we should feel the deepest interest and lend it our heartiest support.

C., the "International Lessons" and other publications by the American Baptist Society at Philadelphia, Pa., "Kind Words" and other papers, which we are obliged to prescribe, and which are used in this country, we do heartily recommend to the use of the people.

SUNDAY, October 3, 1886.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by J. T. Fisher and W. P Southern. The Moderator called the Association to order at 10 o'clock.

Committee on Sabbath Schools reported. Remarks by J. M. Hamlin, S. W. Hamilton, C. M. Gallamore, Elder G. H. Church and V. M. Goodson. Report adopted as follows:

Your committee having had the subject of Sunday-schools under their observation for the last associational year, are able to report progress from the field. At the first annual meeting of this Association in 1882, there were three churches supporting their own schools. What was the exception is now the rule. We have nineteen Baptist schools, supported by seventeen churches.

A union school in a Baptist church is a thing of the past, there not being one in the county. Nearly the same progress has been made in the use of lesson helps; thirteen use Baptist helps. Let us look at the work doing: Our churches have sent out 117 teachers with Bibles in hand to stand alongside the pastors in the promulgation of the gospel. These teachers address an average audience every Sunday, for eight months in the yer, of 705 souls. There are 1,137 pupils enrolled, giving a total of 1,154 engaged in the work. Sixty have professed conversion; \$75.00 have been spent for lesson helps; \$19.25 have been raised for Missions by those schools. Two churches are not engaged in the work. The total membership of all our churches is 1,404 of whom 368 are engaged in the Sunday schools, and 1,036 members, or 66% of our strength unavailable. The great barriers heretofore to the progress of the Sunday school cause have been opposition to denominational organization and the use of lesson helps. This opposition has give way. The pioneer work is done, now what? Our superintendents should study management and organization. Teachers should study now more than ever, in addition to his preparation of the lesson in hand, the best methods of imparting knowledge. The subject of Missions and giving should be permanently incorporated in our work and kept constantly before the schools. Respectfully,
