The election of officers being next in order, the chair appointed M. L. Orr, W. E. Hall, G. L. Glazener and J. C. Owen tellers, who after canvassing the votes, reported as elected: Eld. E. The chair then declared the Association organized and ready for the transaction of business.

HOME AND CONVENTIONAL MISSIONS.

The Home Board is located at Atlanta, Ga. Its work includes all (f the Southern States, the Indian Territory, the District of Columbia and Cuba. It is now working in co-operation with most

of our State Boards. More missionaries were employed by this Board last year and better results attended their labors than ever before. Missionaries 425, weeks of labor 11,466, churches and stations 3,484, sermons and addresses, 46,620, prayer meetings 5,774, baptisms, 5,921, received by letter, 6,519, total additions 10,564, Sunday-schools 2,110, teachers and pupils 23,702, religious visits 52,089, churches constituted 178, houses of worship built 52.

This Board has given our Convention six hundred dollars annually for several years. With this help we ought to be stimulated to do more than we have for our work in Western North Carolina.

May God help us.

The Board of the Western North Carolina Baptist Convention is located at Asheville, and is composed of twenty-three of our wisest and best men, who have oversight of the work in the bounds of the Convention. This Board has had nine missionaries and colporters employed during the last year. These missionaries and colporters have been preaching the gospel, holding protracted meetings, distributing Bibles, Testaments and religious literature and organizing Sunday-schools.

We make special mention of Rev. S.C. Owen, our Sunday-school Missionary, who has succeeded in organizing a Sunday-school Convention in every Association in the bounds of the Convention. We think the mission work and the Sunday-school work are in better condition than ever before, notwithstanding the hard times.

Your corresponding secretary has lost no time during the last year in traveling from county to county, from church to church, from village to village and all over the bounds of the Convention, collecting money to pay off the missionaries in order that the Board may

meet the Convention out of debt.

The plans of carrying on the work will be different next year from this year. The Board intends to take hold of the central points and employ strong men who can develop the churches and hold ministers' institutes, in order that they may be educated more thoroughly in the mission work.

The ladies' mission societies are doing a most noble work. They have given, all together, about eight hundred dollars during

the last year. May God bless them in their work.

#### EDUCATION.

Education means a drawing out of one's self.

From time immemorial the Baptist people and ministers have been regarded as an uncducated sect. This was perhaps something near the truth in times past, but it is certainly a misconception now. One of the four oldest schools in our country is the old Brown University—Baptist to the core. Also, the first president of Harvard was a Baptist. Education of our rank and file has, within this century, advanced more rapidly than any other denomination. The U.S. Census Report, of 1890, credits our denomination with more schools of higher education than any other denomination. Within the last seventy years the greatest meta-physician, Francis Wayland; the greatest expositor, Conant, and the greatest preacher and commentator, John A. Broadus, were each of them Saptists.

Nay, more, in times past our people, as a sect, were "every-where spoken against," but now they have the respect of all.

As the educated man has more power than an ignorant one, the call is imperative to educate our sons and daughters. We cannot wait in the education of our children. Their time is now. We should use this now while we have it.

We point with pride to Wake Forest, with two hundred and forty-six students and more still coming. But is this enough? Is it too much to say that in our own loved State there are one hundred thousand Baptist boys and girls who are looking out for the knowledge to fit them for life's coming battle. Brethren, what is our duty toward them?

Our last year's high school project has not yet materialized.

Shall we give it over? May the Lord incline you to answer the question rightly.

The committee also recommends that J. C. Owen be aided in his course in Wake Forest. We also recommend Bro. Lafayette Powell for aid in getting an education at Breyard.

#### PERIODICALS.

The power of the religious press, as an agency in religious education, is universally acknowledged. In this progressive age no church member can keep apace with his denominational church work and not read its papers. Such papers have become a necessity, (1) because so much trashy and poisonous literature is being distributed through the mails and being read by the youths of this country and influencing them in the wrong direction. (2) To stimlate our church members to more active service for the Lord, Very many of our church members read political and secular papers to the exclusion of their religious papers. As a proof of this the Western North Carolina Baptist has only about 600 subscribers among 20,000 Baptists in Western North Carolina, and all who read it admit that we have the best paper that we have ever had for the money. Brethren, how long shall this state of affairs exist?

We mention with pleasure our new Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va., at 50 cents a year, which is devoted to our Foreign

and Home Mission work.

We call special attention to the literature of our own Baptist Sunday-school Board, located at Nashville, Tenn. The Lesson Helps are surpassed by none, and in some respects, equalled by none. All the income from the sale of its literature is applied to missions in our Southern Baptist Convention. Last year there was \$7,000.00 paid into the treasury of our Boards from its sales.

# C. M. Gallamore, from committee, read report on TEMPERANCE.

Your committee on Temperance, after investigation, find the condition of the churches in this Association in a better state as to their encouraging the use of intoxicants, than they have been for ten years. there are other lines of intemperance that need to be guarded, so that God's blessings may come in great power upon the people. Resolved, That we, the Baptists composing the Transylvania County Association, do pledge our best endeavors in counteracting and, preventing the evils growing out of the liquor traffic. (1) By keeping the temptations out of our homes and away from our children (2) by the practice of personal total abstinence; (3) by influencing our brethren and neighbors in the same direction; (4) by impressing the principles of total abstinence in the Sabbath-schools; (5) by preaching it and praying it in the church, and excluding drinking members; (6) by the use of text-books in the public schools, which teach the physical, intellectual and moral effects of alcoholic liquors; (7) that we look to the All wise God in earnest prayer to aid us in all our efforts as Christians and citizens, to do our whole duty towards the overthrow of this monstrous and powerful evil. . .

J. C. Owen, for the committee read the report on STATE OF THE CHURCHES.

We, your committee on the state of the churches, beg lief to

submit the following report:

As compared with the past, we are glad to note that the condition of the churches is very encouraging. Most of our churches have, within the last year, had good revival meetings, in which many have been added to the army of the Master. We are glad that one, at least, which, last year, was spiritually dead, is now alive and in a

thriving condition.

But when we think of what a church should be. we have not one that approaches the standard. A lack of consecration to God of body, mind and property, is the great defect. Dram-drinking and questionable amusements are indulged in by the laity and even by some of the preachers. Hence, drunkeness, profanity, malice, covetousness, etc., are found prevalent, to a greater or less degree. in all our churches. "My brethren, these things ought not so to be. " This state of affairs has been brought about by sluckness in discipline and neglect of duty. We believe that corrective discipline is made necessary in any caurch of converted members only by their not knowing their duty, or neglecting to do it. Therefore we recommend: 1. That the pastors dilligently teach their churches duty along all lines. 2. That the churches call no man as pastor who is anti-missionary or who indulges in dram drinking in any degree whatever. 3. That no church call a presbytery for the purpose of ordaining to the ministry any man who is unprepared for this work, and that the credentials be taken from every brother whose life has been such as to disqualify him for advancing the Master's cause.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

1. Under the Board. The Foreign Mission Board of the South-

ern Baptist Convention is located at Richmond, Va.

Under its work there are churches in Africa, 4; Brazil, 14; China, 16; Italy, 18; Japan, 7; Mexico, 32. Total, 85. These churches reported 581 baptisms during last year. There are now in these churches 3,493 members, making an increase over the previous year of 570. On these fields are 91 missionaries, 51 are females. There are also 59 native helpers.

The contributions to this work last year were over \$130,000. Of this amount 92 per cent. went to the Foreign field, while 8 per

cent, included all home expenses.

II. The Gospel Mission. This mission is located in the interior of Cama, in a vast territory, extending from the middle of Shantung province on the Northeast, through the populous provlences of Honan, Hupen and Szecheuen, towards the Southwest. Those now in the neld are in Shantung province near the Grand Canal This mission works under the following principles:

1. Missionaries are sent directly by the churches; 2. They trust God and the churches for their support; 3. They live on reduced salaries, and adopt the native dress, food and houses in the main; 4. They confine themselves to giving the heathen the gospel, (including the work of lady and medical missionaries) believing that the Holy Spirit and the gospel are sufficient to convert and save them; 5. No money seas by the churches at come is used to employ mative workers, or to build chapels and school houses; the people, when converted, will do this work for themselves.

The number of missionaries now on the field is 13, and they are praying to God and calling to the churches for an increase of this number to 100. \$450 will support a missionary under this plan, inculding teacher of language, medical bill, etc. For married mis-

sionaries a proportionate amount is needed.

In the interest of the work under the Board, (including also the work of the Home Board, as noted in the report on Sunday-schools) is published the Mission Journal, having ednors in Richmond and Atlanta. In the interest of the Gospel Mission, The Missionary Helper is published monthly at Decatur, Ga. Price 50 cts. a year.

With these missionary facilities and operations, surely no one can longer excuse himself from being properly and fully informed in regard to missionary enterprises, and neglecting to give the heatnen the gospet. Your committee recommends that each church of this Association adopt a missionary, and make definite and regular contributions to his support.

(2) That this Board take charge of the work and exercising their best judgment, go forward, heartily co-operate with other schools in the bounds of this Association in seeking, as Baptists, to properly care for the education of our own boys and girls.

#### THE ORPHANAGE.

The North Cerolina Baptist Orpnan's Home, located at Thomasville, N. C, is a charitable institution, owned and blessed of God. Fine property, suitable to the purposes, has been bought and paid for. There are now about 130 orphan children there to be fed, clothed and educated. The Orphanage is now under the management of Elder J. B. Boone, who was for years president of Judson College, and the work has grown equal to the hopes of its most hopeful friends. These children come poorly clad and dirty sometimes, but they are washed clothed, trained and educated. Many of them are bright and will make grand and good men and women, who but for this Home, would be little better than brutes. The cold winter is upon us, and these children need food and clothing, all of which is to come from voluntary gifts of friends throughut the State. If you can't give money, you can give clothes. Old clothes or new ones. Clothes of any size or kind. Church and eduacational advantages are good, good as your own children have at your own homes. Brethren and sisters, let us do what God requires at our hands by these poor, fatherless, motherless and helpless children. "He that giveth to the poor lendeth to the Lord."

Remarks were made by S. C. Owen and the re-

port was adopted.

S. C. Owen moved that this Association make provision now to support J. C. Owen at Wake Forest

College this year, and for this purpose the following

# SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

We have learned from experience and observation that a good Sunday-school is indispensible to the growth of a church. The Sunday-school is the teaching department of church work where every member can take an active part in carrying out the great commis-

The church that is insensible to its duty in this department of its work, will, ere long, be as the church at Ephesus, the candle stick removed. The church that is the most successful in training the children in its bounds will have the most active and consecrated membership in the future. Nearly all, or quite all, of our churches have Sunday-schools-some for the summer months only-out they need to be made better. Many of them are formal and lifeless, wanting in spirituality, more a social than a religious gathering. We are persuaded that many of the Sunday-school teachers never expect souls to be converted as a result of their teaching. To get our churches to realize the magnitude of this work and become interested in learning the best methods of doing it, is the work now before us. This is the object of our S. S. Convention. It has provided for Township Associations where each church and each individual can be reached through the Sunday-school. An organizer was appointed in each township, and but one has done anything. Miss Sue Robinson has organized Gloncester and held two conventions. Through this organization the number in the Sunday-schools have been largely increased. The home class department is a successrul method of reaching every family in a community. If this plan of organization is well worked, every family may be reached. 1. 1t worth doing? Brethren, what are we going to de to get our people to take hold of this work?

With pleasure we mention the success of our S. S. Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located at Nashville, Tenu, It closed the 4th year of its existence last May, having each receipts from cash sales of its periodicals amounting to \$53,034.52; \$5,916.83 was paid into the treasuries of our Home and Foreign Boards for mission purposes, with a balance on hand of \$2,495.51. Thus we see that our S. S. Board promises fair to be one of the greatest sources of revenue to our S. B. Convention. We can also most heartly recommend the literature of this Board as being in every way worth of our patronage. It is pure in doctrine, simple in style, varied in its range of subjects. The peculiar doctrines of Baptist and the sucject of missions are constantly kept before our people. Another department of this Board's work is preparing programs for Missionary day. This Board raised last year, in this way, \$6,000 or \$8,000 for Home and Foreign Missions.

Brethren, let us take pride enough in every department of our Sunday-school work for Christ's sake, to co-operate with every movement for the furtherance of our common Sunday-school cause. S. C. OWEN, Chairman.
