#### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called the Transylvania Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. This Association shall meet annually Wednesday after the first Sunday in August, and be composed of ordained ministers belonging to, and members chosen annually by, the several churches belonging to this body, who, by bearing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

ARTICLE 3. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty.

ARTICLE 4. The letters from the churches shall state the number baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and died during the preceding year, and present membership, the amount paid for local church expenditures, and amounts contributed for other objects of the North Carolina and Southern Baptist Convention and this Association, and for other purposes, and such additional information as may be necessary.

ARTICLE 5. This Association recognizes Christ as the only law-giver in religion; it recognizes each church as an independent body, and it recognizes that it has no power or authority to infringe on the internal rights of any individual church.

ARTICLE 6. The Association shall have the power to with-

draw from a church that shall knowingly and wilfully depart from the orthodox principles of Christianity as taught in the New Testament, and as interpreted by regular Missionary Baptists.

ARTICLE 7. The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer and a Historian, all of whom shall be elected annually in such manner as the body may decide.

ARTICLE 8. The Clerk shall keep a faithful, accurate and intelligible record of the proceedings of the Association, and shall have the minutes published and distributed among the churches. He shall be paid twelve dollars (\$12.00) out of the minute fund for his services.

ARTICLE 9. The Treasurer shall receive and pay over to the proper persons all money sent to the Association, or to him as Treasurer and shall make an annual report to the body.

ARTICLE 10. The Historian shall collect up and put in some durable form all the facts of interest of the several churches and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Executive Committee of seven members comprised as follows:—Two pastors living in the bounds of the Association, two laymen, one woman representative of the Woman's Missionary Union, one person representing the B. Y. P. U. work and one person representing the Sunday School work. The Committee shall carry into effect the decisions of the Association when necessary or not otherwise provided for, and if the occasion arises, it shall act for the Association between sessions. The Committee shall be elected annually by the Association.

ARTICLE 12. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any session by a majority of those voting.

## Proceedings

#### Wednesday Morning

1. The fifty-ninth annual session of the Transylvania Baptist Association met with the Cathey's Creek Church on Wednesday, August 7, at 10 o'clock. Vice Moderator, Rev. A. J. Manley, called the meeting to order and the session opened by singing "What a Friend".

Rev. S. F. McCauley, pastor of Brevard Second Baptist Church, conducted devotional.

- 2. Rev. Lawrence Erwin, pastor of Carr's Church, preached the annual sermon using as text, "How shall they hear without a preacher, etc."
  - 3. Delegates were enrolled and visitors recognized.
- 4. In business session, the association elected by acclamation Rev. J. L. Underwood, pastor of Mt. Moriah, Calvert, Moderator; Rev. B. W. Thomason, Pastor Brevard, Vice-Moderator; N. L. Ponder, Clerk; T. C. Henderson, Treasurer-Historian; J. W. Glazener, Associational Sunday School Superintendent; Mrs. J. L. Underwood, W. M. U. President and Charles Allen, B. T. U. Director.
- 5. The Moderator appointed as committee, E. Carl Allison, T. C. Henderson, and Rev. W. S. Price to report on accepting Brevard Second Church as a member of the Association.
- 6. Alfred E. Hampton gave the report on Temperance and Public Morals. Brother Hampton and M. A. Adams discussed the report. A donation of \$11.24 was given Brother Adams for support of the cause of Dry Forces. After discussion the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON PUBLIC MORALS AND TEMPERANCE

We hear so much these days about public morals and temperance and what do these words really mean? Moral is conduct of life, behavior, and temperance is sobrlety and total abstinence; really summed up, is clean living.

The Bible, first of all, is the Book of Wisdom about clean living. God in His Holy Word, demands of His children just that: clean living, which means more than just an outward show, for our bodies are the temples of the Holy Spirit. What is the Christian standard of clean living? "Whether ye eat or drink, do all to the glory of

God." God revealed His standards of holy living when He gave the children of Israel, through Moses, the Ten Commandments. In Psalms 24, 3 and 4, David said: "He that has clean hands and a pure heart, shall ascend unto the hill of the Lord and shall stand in His holy place."

Jesus, Himself, in His sermon on the Mount, gave the high standard of Christian morality and purity was not merely an outward act, but a heart attitude and desire. Romans 6:12 we have "Let not sin reign in your mortal body that ye shall obey it in the lust thereof," and in Peter 2:11 we have "Abstain against fleshly lusts, which war against the soul." Reverence for God, when we seek His divine counsel and guidance in all things, is the foundation of all noble behavior. Intemperate living would be reduced to a minimum even by church members, if their attitude towards this matter was reverence for the Lord. One of the greatest evils in this age is that of strong drink and we have in Old Testament, God's words in regard to this form of intemperance.

We have in the life of Jesus, from Nazareth to Calvary, the value of clean living and we should strive, with His help, to follow His example.

"Godliness is profitable for all things, having promise of the life which now is, and of that which is to come."

  - M. A. Huggins spoke on the Cooperative Program.
- 8. T. C. Henderson as committee chairman reported a unanimous decision on admittance of the Brevard Second Church as a member of the Association. The report was adopted.
- 9. M. A. Huggins introduced David Morgan who spoke as representative of the Biblical Recorder.

#### Wednesday P. M.

- 10. The afternoon session opened by singing "In the Cross" with devotional conducted by Rev. Loyd Jones.
  - 11. The moderator named the following to report as com-

mittee on committees: A. M. Paxton, Valrey Carter, Frank Whitmire, Mrs. M. H. Holliday, Alfred E. Hampton, C. A. McCall and Ed McGaha.

The Moderator also named as committee on time, place and preacher, J. W. Glazener, A. O. Brown, and Rev. W. S. Price.

- 12. Miss Irene Dixon spoke on the work of Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Miss Dixon reported conducting 10 schools in the Association during the year. The Moderator spoke of planning to improve the vacation Bible school work next year.
- 13. Rev. J. L. Underwood read the report on Baptist Hospitals. Rev. J. A. McCaughan brought a splendid message on the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem. After discussion the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem was established in June, 1923. More than 47,000 patients have received treatment since the institution was founded. Nineteen thousand of the above number were not able to pay. Fourteen thousand of the 47,000 were mothers who returned home to be with their 42,000 children. During the seventeen years of work, the hospital has rendered in free service \$1,900,000.

More than 4,000 patients were treated the past year, and 1,200 of these were mothers. One hundred ministers were treated.

One thousand patients from Winston-Salem were refused service last year. These were able to pay, so that meant turning down \$70,000 in cash. These were turned away to serve the original purpose of the hospital, to treat charity patients. If the hospital operated for pay, it could get along without our offerings.

The Training School for Nurses has an enrollment of 60. Only 17 new students out of 500 applications could enter for training in September because of limited quarters.

The tragedy of the year has been that more than 3,000 patients who applied for treatment had to be turned away because there were no empty beds available.

But now the institution is to be enlarged to double its capacity. The Wake Forest School of Medicine is to be located on the hospital grounds. The crowded conditions, we trust, will be relieved. The hope is to take care of 8,000 to 10,000 patients a year and in the vastly enlarged work the one purpose will be to treat the sick and needy.

We urge the churches of the association to make worthy offerings on Mother's Day, and other days. All churches should make a worthy contribution to the building program.

#### REPORT ON CONDITION OF CHURCHES

The condition of the churches in the Transylvania Association is by no means what we would desire to see. Most of the members of a majority of our churches do not appreciate the work that is being done by our pastors, as illustrated by the amounts reported given for pastors' salaries. Many members of our churches are not Missionary Baptists, if we are to know them by the contributions made to the cooperative program. We do not believe in "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father," if our contributions to the orphanage give a real illustration of our belief. Large numbers of our church members do not magnify Christ in their lives in that they do not keep themselves unspotted from the world. Many of them walk in the counsel of the ungodly, and stand in the way of sinners, and sit in the seat of the scornful, instead of having their delight in the law of the Lord and meditating in that law daily.

While it is true that many members of our churches do not attend the church services and do nothing to help in carrying on the work of Christ's kingdom, yet there are those in our churches who long to see the kingdom of Christ established in our midst and who are faithful in their efforts to support all the work of the church as commanded by the founder of the church, Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord. The reports to the association from the churches

show a little progress made during the past year. We need real revivals in all of our churches, revivals among our church members as well as among those who make no profession of faith in Christ. May we hope that during the associational year upon which we are just entering the pastors, deacons, Sunday school superintendents and teachers, as well as the other members of our churches may rededicate their lives to Christ and that many unsaved souls may be brought into the kingdom and enlisted in the service of the church during this associational year.

18. Mrs. M. H. Holliday read report on orphanage. John Arch McMillan, repreenting the Mills Home Orphanage, brought greetings from the orphan children. Upon motion the orphanage report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

Taken as a whole the past year has been one of the best in the history of the orphanage. The health of the children has been good. They have passed another year without a death in the large family. The number of children at the Mills Home is 144 and at Kennedy Home 133, making a total of 577.

Current funds for 1939 showed a slight increase over the previous year. The Thanksgiving offering was almost \$60,000, one of the best they have ever received. The repairs that must necessarily be made on some of the older buildings is a constant drain on this fund.

There are 8 children from our association in the Mills Home, and 6 from this association cared for through the Mother's Aid. Our association gave in cash in the year 1939 \$453.66. Only 16 churches sent something in the year, but all do not send each month.

I wish to urge all churches to send in offering each month. It should be a joy to us to make an effort to support in every possible way our orphanage.

Glazener, newly-elected Sunday School Associational Superintendent.

28. Mrs J. L. Underwood read report on and discussed the W. M. U. activities. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

We are pleased to report that the Woman's Missionary Union of this association is making substantial gains along some lines. More of our women and young people are subscribing to our missionary periodicals than ever before.

Nine of the churches of the association are enlisted in Woman's Missionary Union work and these churches were well represented at our annual meeting which was held at Mt. Moriah, Cherryfield, in June. We were highly privileged to have with us at this meeting Mrs. W. D. Briggs, State W. M. U. secretary; Mrs. J. R. Morgan, superintendent of the Asheville Division of Woman's Missionary Union, and Mrs. Jaeckel of Hendersonville, stewardship chairman of the Asheville division. We were inspired by their messages to do our best to he p others to know of the love of Christ.

Another important meeting was held on July 24th at Little River church where Miss Mary Currin met with a number of our young people and their counselors. Her coming was a great blessing to those who heard her.

We believe that the work of our Woman's Missionary Union, with its study of the fields at home and abroad, impels us to pray and to give of our means and ourselves for the telling of the good news at home and abroad.
