Constitution and By-Laws

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called the Transylvania Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. This Association shall meet annually Wednesday after the first Sunday in August, and be composed of ordained ministers belonging to, and members chosen annually by, the several churches belonging to this body, who, by bearing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

ARTICLE 3. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty.

ARTICLE 4. The letters from the churches shall state the number baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and died during the preceding year, and present membership, the amount paid for local church expenditures, and amounts contributed for other objects of the North Carolina and Southern Baptist Convention and this Association, and for other purposes, and such additional information as may be necessary.

ARTICLE 5. This Association recognizes Christ as the only

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law-giver in religion; it recognizes each church as an independent body, and it recognizes that it has no power or authority to infringe on the internal rights of any individual church.

ARTICLE 6. The Association shall have the power to withdraw from a church that shall knowingly and wilfully depart from the orthodox principles of Christianity as taught in the New Testament, and as interpreted by regular Missionary Baptists.

ARTICLE 7. The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer and a Historian, all of whom shall be elected annually in such manner as the body may decide.

ARTICLE 8. The Clerk shall keep a faithful, accurate and intelligible record of the proceedings of the Association, and shall have the minutes published and distributed among the churches. He shall be paid twenty dollars (\$20.00) out of the minute fund for his services.

ARTICLE 9. The Treasurer shall receive and pay over to the proper persons all money sent to the Association, or to him as Treasurer and shall make an annual report to the body.

ARTICLE 10. The Historian shall collect up and put in some durable form all the facts of interest of the several churches and make an annual report to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Executive Committee of seven members comprised as follows: Two pastors living in the bounds of the Association, two laymen, one woman representative of the Woman's Missionary Union, one person representing the B. Y. P. U. work and one person representing the Sunday School work. The Committee shall carry into effect the decisions of the Association when necessary or not otherwise provided for, and if the occasion arises, it shall act for the Association between sessions. The Committee shall be elected annually by the Association.

ARTICLE 12. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any session by a majority of those voting.

PROCEEDINGS

Wednesday Morning

1. The sixtieth annual session of the Transylvania Baptist association met with Oak Grove church on Wednesday, August 6 at 10 o'clock. Rev. J. L. Underwood, Moderator, presided and the session opened by singing Amazing Grace. Rev. E. R. Pendleton led in prayer and Rev. W. S. Price, pastor of Enon church, conducted devotional.

2. Messengers were enrolled and visitors recognized.

3. Report of Sunday Schools by E. L. Ponder was read and after discussions by Rev. B. W. Thomasson and Rev. E. R. Pendleton the report was adopted..

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

It is gratifying to know that every active church in the Association (26 out of 28) reported Sunday School work last year. There are evidences of much good work being done in several churches.

An association-wide meeting, held at Brevard First Church during the year was well attended. The meeting was conducted by Sybil Burnette of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board. Certain objectives were set by the churches for a year's work. It is hoped these churches will attain these objectives, namely: taking religious census, working toward the standard of excellence, holding Vacation Bible Schools, organizing cradle roll departments, extension departments, conducting study classes for diplomas, etc.

Pisgah Forest, Oak Grove and Carr's Hill churches are to be commended for rebuilding and putting in Sunday School rooms. Blue Ridge, a church not reporting anything in recent years, is building a new house and we will hear from them next year. Other churches in the association will enlarge their number of Sunday School rooms in the near future if the right kind of Sunday School work is done. Macedonia, a church far back in the mountains, reports sponsoring a Mission Sunday School, called Little Pisgah.

5. Miss Lorena Merrill, director of Vacation Bible Schools for the association gave a report on the Bible School work. After discussion by Miss Merrill the report was adopted.

REPORT ON VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

I find from the Southern Baptist statistical summary in 1925 we had only 300 Daily Vacation Bible schools; in 1940, 5,756 schools, making an increase of 5,456 schools in 15 years in the entire South.

In 1935 there were 70 schools in North Carolina and in 1940 there were 606.

Out of the 72 associations in North Carolina in 1935, 32 had Vacation Bible Schools. In 1940 the number had doubled, from 32 to 64.

The Transylvania Association is made up of 28 churches. The first D. V. B. school to be reported was held with the Brevard First Church in 1926.

In 1939 Miss Irene Dixon came to us from the State Mission Board and organized 8 schools. In 1940 there were 10 schools with enrollment of 475 and average attendance of 360. In 1941 there were 10 schools enrolling 602 and averaging attendance of 460.

Through the Vacation Bible School the children have contributed to various missions, the orphanage, the hospital, Great Britain and the local churches. Some contributed articles made, such as tables, bird houses, dish towels, dresses, quilts, work bags, scrap books, posters, foot mats, jig saw puzzles, stories of lives of Bible characters, mounted pictures, etc.

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Also children have learned many songs and developed in singing, and studied the lives of men and women of the Bible. Many Bible verses were learned, books of the Bible, etc. Many children have been converted to Christ through these schools.

6. The congregation sang "Sweet Hour of Prayer", Rev. J. A. Anderson led in prayer and Rev. B. W. Thomason, Pastor of Brevard First Church, preached the annual sermon.

Wednesday P. M.

7. The afternoon session opened by singing hymns "Precious Name" and "I Need Thee." Rev. N. H. Chapman, pastor of Oak Grove church conducted devotionals.

8. Rev. S. B. McCall, of the Caldwell Association and former moderator of the Transylvania Association made an appeal for help in building Oak Grove Church. An offering was taken which amounted to \$25.68, to be applied on the building.

9. T. C. Henderson read the report on Cooperative Program. Rev. J. C. Pipes spoke on the cooperative program. The report was adopted.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program continues to grow in favor with Southern Baptists for various reasons, a few of which are here given.

The Cooperative Program is scriptural; it includes all the causes in the Great Commission and these only. It is comprehensive and unifying; every cause included challenges. We do not give to the Program, but to the various causes *through* the program. It is a plan for doing the best things in the best way.

The Cooperative Program is democratic and Baptist. It recognizes the rights and independence of every church and member, appealing to their minds and hearts. It is economical; it seeks to care for all the causes together, thus saving expenses and not interfering with the regular work and programs of the churches.

The Cooperative Program is fair and equitable; it seeks to provide for all causes in proportion to their relative needs. Our state convention determines the percentage each cause shall receive out of cooperative funds contributed in North Carolina.

5.—That all denominational funds be remitted promptly and properly marked each month to General Secretary, M. A. Huggins, Raleigh, N. C.

12. Dr. Smith Hagaman, Supt. of the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem, brought a message from the orphanage for Dr. I. G. Greer, who was to represent the orphanage, but was not able to attend. Dr. Hagaman spoke of the enlarged work the hospital is doing.

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REPORT ON HOSPITALS

In God's word we read about Jesus healing the suffering and in Matt. 10-1 Jesus when he had called unto him his twelve disciples gave them power against unclean spirits to cast them out and to heal all manner of sickness and all diseases.

The Baptists of North Carolina own and operate a hospital at Winston-Salem, N. C., for the treatment of the sick and suffering. We earnestly request especially the Baptist of our State when they have to go to a hospital, if possible to go to the Baptist Hospital there.

Since it is largely supported by donations we urge every Sunday School Superintendent, when the time comes for a special offering that they make a special effort to secure as large an offering as possible.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

The purpose of the Baptist Orphanage is to prepare poor promising orphans for the duties and responsibilities of life.

The orphanage operates two homes: The Mills Home at Thomasville and the Kennedy Home at Kinston.

During the year 1940 the orphanage has cared for 739 children, about the same number as last year.

These children are being cared for by three agencies: Mother's Aid, boarding homes, and the orphanage proper.

There have been 59 children cared for in their own homes at a cost of \$1,440.00. Twenty-eight children have been placed in boarding homes at a cost of \$3,959.31.

The general health of the large orphanage family remains above the average for so large a group. This is due to the splendid co-operation in the cottages in checking early on illnesses or injuries before they become serious.

Charity and Children, the paper published by the orphanage, is the right arm of the institution. Besides giving information on the work, the paper carries a good run of religious reading. Also, it gives valuable training to a large number of boys who do the printing. The circulation of the paper has reached an all-time peak with more than 30,000 copies printed each week. The profit on the paper and job work for last year was \$4,977.83. The price for a single subscription is \$1.00 per year and in clubs of 10 or more to one address, 60 cents per year.

The church life of the orphanage is an important phase of the

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work. The churches are financed by the members. No contributions that come to the orphanage are used for the support of the church. Well organized Sunday Schools are conducted every Sunday morning followed by preaching service at 11:00 o'clock. Both churches are fortunate in having fully graded W. M. U.'s and special emphasis is placed on the work of young people.

Approximately 275 boys and girls have gone through Kennedy Home since its establishment. All of these without an exception have made professions of faith in the Lord before leaving that institution.

Most of the children make good when they leave the orphanage. Many are now holding places of honor and usefulness in the civic, economic and church life of the communities where they live.

"An orphan's home is a place where sometimes the least prospects furnish the greatest opportunity and the smallest investment brings the greatest returns."

Perhaps no other orphanage in all the world is so bound up with the Sunday Schools as ours. The orphanage is dependent on the Once-A-Month Offerings and the Special Thanksgiving Offering from the Sunday Schools. If each one of the 2,454 Sunday Schools in North Carolina would be careful of the offerings, the orphanage treasurer could pay all obligations promptly.

The total amount received from Transylvania Association for the Orphanage current fund from August 1, 1940, to August 1, 1941, was \$644.40.

The Orphanage is a means by which all who want to do something in the name of Jesus may enrich their spiritual lives. What shall the harvest be? You have the answer.

17. Rev. Lawrence Erwin read the report on Religious Literature. The following discussed the report: W. L. Baucom, Rev. Lawrence Erwin and Rev. W. H. Nicholson.

The report was adopted.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

We have literature today that is called religious literature that is far from being religious. Any literature that leads one from the teachings of Jesus, or any part of the Word of God is not religious.

We know without a doubt that the Bible is pure wholesome literature. The Bible is one of the greatest blessings bestowed by God on the children of men. The Bible has God for its author; salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture for its matter. It is all pure, all sincere; nothing too much; nothing wanting. The Bible through the ages has transformed men's lives. "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to thy word." Psalms 119:9.

We as Christians come in contact with all types of literature. Some of it sounds very religious when it is being read, but it leads one from the truth which is recorded in God's Word. One should be familiar with the Word of God to the extent that he or she can be able to know what to read and to believe.

There are many religious books that can be purchased at our Baptist book stores and other places, which are approved by our Baptist leaders. These books are very helpful to any Christian. Christians should be very careful in selecting books to read. One should select the type of literature that will help him or her to grow as a Christian. The reason numbers of Christians do not grow in the Christian life is because they failed to read the right type of literature.

We are happy to report a good year in W. M. U. work. Ten churches of the association have Woman's Missionary Societies, and four of the ten have one or more W. M. U. young people's groups.

During this year we are emphasizing as we have not done before the Hundred Thousand Club. We have set as our goal for this object \$115.00, and we are confident of reaching it. Our goal for the co-operative program is \$330.00. Last year our total gifts to missions were \$542.65. This year we expect to give more than \$600.00.

Another emphasis of this year is the missionary education of young people. We feel that this is very important. Mrs. M. C. Shipman, our young people's leader, has promoted this work. We have had special study courses and camps for them. We hope to make greater progress during the coming year.

REPORT ON CONDITION OF CHURCHES

To write on churches or other subjects the writer should visit every church in the association, and get first-hand information as to just what is going along in the different churches, and in so doing, a much better report could be rendered each year. We realize that most of our churches have made some improvements in the past year, either in a building way or other conditions, but they are far short of what they should be spiritually. We need more of the Old Time Religion brought into our churches, something that will remind us of the bygone days. Less formality and more religion will help all the churches in our association. We need to grow in Christian Fellowship and the love of Our Blessed Savior. Our churches are just what we members make them. If our churches are not what they should be, let's not put all the blame on the pastor, but let every member take an inventory of himself or herself, and see just where the blame should be placed for the church not growing as

it should.

Some of our churches have made fine improvements on the buildings by adding Sunday School rooms which cost several hundred dollars, and from the report I got, the work and building material were paid for when completed. Oak Grove, the church the association is meeting with this year, has built from the ground floor up, and the members of the church and others who are not members of the church are to be congratulated for the fine work done so far, and when completed Oak Grove will be one of our nicest churches in the association. Loyalty to Christ and co-operation by the members can do any thing in the way of church building or winning souls for Christ. Church conditions as a whole are not what they should be at all, so it is up to the members who claim to be follows of our Blessed Lord, to get busy and make our churches grow in the coming year as they never have before.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

In making a report on temperance and morals it is easy to use generalities. Such a report, however, too often leaves us with the complacent feeling that the conditions reported on are those of some far-away community, and do not apply to us or to our particular communities. Since most of you are as familiar, or perhaps more so than I am with conditions over the state and nation as a whole, I shall try and call to your attention in this report conditions in our own county.

The temperance and morality of a community are judged by the way the laws of each are observed or breached in the community. If we apply that criterion to our own community we find conditions which ought to be disturbing. There a great many violations of the law that are, of course, never reported to the law enforcement officers. There is no way of estimating correctly the number of such violations. We do have, however, a record of those that get into the courts. For the purpose of this report I have taken the records of our Superior Court only. Cases in this court, as you know, are those of a serious nature, out of the jurisdiction of justices of the peace and mayors, or those that reach the Superior Court through appeals from these lower courts. While I have not been able to get an accurate record of the cases tried before justices of the peace and th mayors of the two incorporated towns in the county, I doubt if more than half, certainly not more than two-thirds, ever reach the Superior Court. The figures which are given below represent, therefore, not more than half to two-thirds of all the cases that were tried in the county.

For the period from August 1, 1940, to August 1, 1941, there were 242 criminal cases tried and disposed of by convictions in the Superior Court. In each of these cases there were from one to three defendants. An analysis of these cases shows that there were 54 cases of drunken driving, 50 cases of public drunkenness, 38 cases of assault, both simple and with deadly weapons, 26 cases of violation of the prohibition law, 20 cases of larceny, 12 cases of reckless driving, 10 cases of forgery, 10 cases of abandonment and non-support, 5 gambling cases, 4 adultery, and 27 others, including affrays, trespass, sale of tip boards, carrying concealed weapons and other miscellaneous crimes.

If there were only one defendant in each of these cases it would mean that two per cent of our entire county population were tried and convicted in the Superior Court during the yast year. If the 242 cases averaged one and one-half defendants, which would be more nearly the truth, then about three percent of our entire population were convicted of some crime in our Superior Court last year. If this rate were uniform over the State of North Carolina it would mean that more than one hundred thousand persons would be convicted annually in our superior courts. And this does not include those whose cases were tried and finally disposed of before justices of the peace and mayors! Of course we have nothing like this number tried and convicted in the state, so we see that our rate is considerably higher than the state average.

I confess that I am not able to give you a satisfactory explanation of how the condition has come about that is reflected in the

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court records that I have cited. There are, however, certain self-evident conditions that tend in my opinion to cause it. The first of these is the lack of Sabbath observance on the part of our people. Men have forgotten the teachings of God about the Sabbath, and no longer observe it as He willed that we should. There is not a church in the county that does not now suffer because of the lack of attendance of those who are engaged in some work or business or pleasure pursuit that interferes with their church going. The second is the ease with which intoxicating drinks can be obtained in this "dry" county of ours. There are thirteen places licensed to sell beer in the county and three places to sell wine. Both of these drinks are intoxicating as is evidenced that practically every person who is tried for public drunkenness swears under oath that he became drunk off beer or wine. There are, in addition, the blockaders and bootleggers who make and sell hard liquor. The third, and perhaps hardest to overcome, is the indifference of the most of us to the first two which I have mentioned. Too many of us are prone to feel that the matter does not concern us unless it touches us or our immediate families. We should think it folly to let a dangerous disease rage in our community and make no effort to stamp it out until we or our families were stricken with it. It is ever greater folly to sit idle and allow the two spiritual diseases of Sabbath violation and drunkenness to grow without making an effort to root them out and destroy them.

In making a report of this kind it is also easy to dwell too much on the dark side of the picture. Let me remind you, therefore, that there are yet a host of men and women in this country who are zealously serving the Lord. My own church is growing in numbers and in its work. I believe that the same is true of most of the other churches of the Association. I believe that we have more and better trained workers now than we have ever had. We have quicker and better means of travel and communication over our county than ever before. We are far better equipped to raise the level of temperance and morals in this county than we have ever been. By the same standards our blame will be the greater if we do not show some improvement in them during the coming year. With God's help we can if we will try. I believe that we shall!
