# Proceedings

## WEDNESDAY MORNING

- 1. The sixty-second annual session of the Transylvania Baptist Association met with the Glady Branch Church, August 4, 1943, with T. C. Henderson, Moderator, presiding.
  - 2. Rev. B. W. Thomason conducted devotional.
  - 3. Clerk read roll call of churches.
  - 4. Moderator read program, which was adopted.
- 5. Moderator appointed the following as committee on committees: Rev. W. S. Price, Mrs. Will Morris and A. M. Paxton.

Committee on Time, Place and Preacher: J. W. Glazener, Rev. N. H. Chapman and Mrs. Seldon Jones.

6. Clerk read report on Baptist Hospital as prepared by Mrs. M. C. Shipman. The report was discussed by Rev. E. R. Pendleton and L. E. Hollifield. After discussion the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The fundamental purpose for which the Baptist Hospital has operated for the past twenty years is: that it shall be an institution through which the half-million Baptists of our state may ren-

der a definite Christian service to sick and suffering humanity who could not, in most instances, have hospital treatment. It is the purpose of the denomination and the management that it shall forever remain true to the purpose for which it was established in addition to its wider service.

During the year 1942, the Baptist Hospital, with its enlarged facilities has more adequately served the Baptists of North Carolina. 12,000 patients instead of 4,000 previously treated can be adequately cared for, or an average of 33 a day. Of these 12 000 patients 4,000 were unable to pay a hospital bill. In addition approximately 175 ministers, returned missionaries, ministerial students and children from our orphanage received attention for which no charge was made. This year was the largest Mother's Day offering ever as well as generous contributions of linen.

In spite of so many of our doctors entering the service of our country it maintains a staff of around 75 doctors, most of them specialists in several fields of Medicine and Surgery; a nursing staff of 189, which includes 116 students, 51 staff and graduate nurses, and 22 nurses and Red Cross aids. It is one of the functions of the Baptist Hospital to educate as many nurses as possible with the Christian ideal of service. These are always selected so as to represent as nearly as possible every section of the state.

The American Medical Association has given the Baptist Hospital the highest rating of any hospital in the south, save one. We have indeed a great institution. Let us help foster the purposes for which it was established and pray God that it might continue its great work.

7. N. L. Ponder read and discussed the report on condition of churches. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON CONDITION OF CHURCHES

An intelligent report on Condition of Churches cannot be made unless one has facts and figures of present conditions. Oral reports from members of some of the Churches show that about half are knowingly better and advanced over last year.

From tabulations based from reports in church letters so far received there is a marked gain in church membership and money contributed to all causes. The same letters show a decrease in Sunday School enrollment and attendance. The number of Daily Vacation Bible Schools remains same as last year but there is an increase in enrollment and attendance.

Any general survey of general present conditions shows there is room for improvement. There is always that number of slackers who needs kind attention toward enlistment and training. There remain those unchurched for us to evangelise. One great need in all our work is more trained leaders, as well as the membership. In the Lord's service we need training as well as in our government service.

#### REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

"Go ye into all the world." Mark 16:15.

"How can they go except they be sent." Rom. 10:15.

The gospel has been committeed to the church, and the church exists for the purpose of sending it to the ends of the earth. The Cooperative Program is the plan of action of Southern Baptists to answer effectively God's call to make Him known to a lost and ruined world. For some twenty years it has been used for supporting our several agencies. Through it each Baptist has a share in the regular support of every object. In it we cooperate with each other and with God in making disciples of all nations.

Our money passes through the local church treasuries to the treasury of the Baptist State Convention. The portion marked "Cooperative Program" is divided on a percentage basis between State Convention Agencies and Southern Baptist Convention Agencies. The State Convention objects are State Missions; Baptist Colleges; and Baptist Hospital. The Southern Convention objects are Foreign Missions; Home Missions; Seminaries, Hospitals in New Orleans and Relief and Annuity Boards. Thus the plan for spending has proved simple, sensible and workable.

But what of a plan for securing funds? We recommend Christians paying their tithes. Then God's kingdom work will have all the money needed to send the gospel to every nook and corner of the world.

The missionary enterprise must go in spite of war, for the spread of the gospel in the most important work in all the world. Let us continue to finance missions for the saving of men's souls

and lives. It is the investment that will bring the richest dividends for,

"With that which we cannot keep May we obtain that which we cannot lose,"

## REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

This is the third war the Baptist Orphanage has been called upon to survive. Each time it has met the challenge. The present war exacted a heavy toll on the entire orphanage, including individual homes of the employees. Approximately 160 boys and girls who once lived in the orphanage are now in service.

The year 1942 from a financial point of view, was the best year in the history of the orphanage. In spite of the rising cost of living, they are making an effort, not only to keep the income on a par with expenses, but also to lay aside a small reserve.

Today as never before the orphanage, like the nation as a whole, feels torn between two great urges, one to win the war and the other, in winning the war, to preserve the things for which we are fighting. The first we will do even though it means the giving of some of our orphanage boys and our own sons; the second we must do, if we are to rebuild this shocked and battered world. In order to do this we must safeguard the youth of today. During recent months, we have heard a great deal about the four freedoms, freedom from fear, freedom of worship, freedom from want, freedom of speech. In guaranteeing these freedoms to the children of the future we must instil in them those time honored qualities of industry, initiative integrity, self reliance and tolerance that will determine aright the destiny of our future.

#### REPORT ON W. M. U.

We are glad to report that the Woman's Missionary Union of Transylvania County has made substantial progress in the past year, particularly in the number of organizations, in the number of Mission Study Classes held, and in contributions.

We now have twelve churches with active missionary organizations. Five of these churches have young people's organizations. Brevard First has three. Calvert has three. Cherryfield has four. Little River has three. Pisgah Forest has one. Total, fourteen, an increase of four. These young folks have contributed \$214.33 to March 31st 1943, beginning June 30th 1942. When the last fiscal quarter is reported the total will be more than we now report. Mrs. Martin Shipman, their consecrated associational leader, says: "Our greatest need is consecrated leaders, and mothers who have their children's welfare at heart".

The total contributions we are able to report from all W. M. U. organizations in the Association from June 30th 1942 to June 30th 1943 is \$1,161.99.

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Note: (Committee wishes to submit this as a report on Religious Literature.

We are very happy to be able to give a good report on the

BIBLICAL RECORDER this year. The circulation of the paper since August, 1942, has increased rapidly. The present circulation approximates 18,000, which means a net gain since last August of more than 7,000. For this increase we are profoundly grateful to God and to the pastors and leaders of North Carolina Baptists who have supported the paper enthusiastically and have done what they could to get it into the homes of the people. We want to express our appreciation to General Secretary M. A. Huggins and all the State workers for the great help which they have rendered.

The paper has also shown good progress financially. The State Convention very generously agreed to grant to the RECORD-ER a thousand dollars a month, but we are happy to report that we have had to call on the Convention for not more than fifty per cent of this amount, practically all of which has been used to pay for paper on which the RECORDER is printed. We should like very much for the RECORDER to be entirely self supporting; but we are getting out such a high quality paper, and in many cases sending it to the people for less than cost, that it is rather difficult to do this. However, the important thing is to get out a good wholesome paper and to get it into the homes of our Baptist people.

The RECORDER has three simple subscription plans: \$2.00 a year for individual subscriptions; \$1.50 a year for clubs — a minimum of at least three subscriptions is required for every church reporting less than a hundred members, and five subscriptions for every church reporting more than a hundred members; \$1.20 a year for the budget or family plan — one subscription for each active, resident church family is required. We hope that pastors, superintendents, deacons Training Union, and W. M. U. leaders will do what they can to encourage a good club in every Baptist church or, better still, to persuade the churches to inaugurate the budget plan.

Our aim is to make the BIBLICAL RECORDER both a good, wholesome, attractive weekly that will be of interest and help to the whole family circle and a solid, substantial denominational journal; and we feel, since it is the organ of our Baptist State Convention and because of the service it will render, that it ought to be in every North Carolina Baptist home. We hope our Baptist people will remember us constantly in prayer and let us hear from them if they have any material or suggestions for the good of the paper, or if we can be of any service to them. One of the great needs for our people is that they be informed, trained, and enlisted in the whole program of the church and the Kingdom of God; and we feel that the BIBLICAL RECORDER is of immense value in this great cause. We want to be a comrade and helper to every Baptist home and church in North Carolina and do what we can

for the support of every cause dear to the hearts of our people. We would follow the injunction of Paul to Timothy: "Give diligence to present thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, handling aright the word of truth."

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS

Much could be said under these subjects, for in recent years it is noticeable there is an increase in public drunkenness, the laxity in decent living and juvenile delinquency. It is nothing uncommon to see young people, in their teen age, frequently at road houses and other places where intoxicating drinks are being sold.

Each month we see a tabulation in our daily paper, of cases tried in the police court of one of our adjoining counties. The majority of these cases are public drunkness, operating a car under the influence of whiskey and immorality that originates while under the influence of whiskey, wine or beer.

It can be truthfully said that alcohol is America's greatest enemy. Unlike the armies of Hitler, Mussolini and Tojo, alcohol not only takes the lives of hundreds of thousands of American citizens, but it leaves them without hope of a life hereafter, for in God's word, it clearly states that no drunkard shall enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Again it state that "the glutton and drunkard shall come to poverty and drowsiness shall clothe a man with rags." Again in First Corinthians 6, "Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived, neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind"

We deplore the fact that our State through legislative enactments, permitted certain counties to set up ABC liquor stores and licensed the sale of wine and beer in other dry counties.

The whisky barons would preach to you that there is a great profit to the counties handling whiskey. Where does this profit come from, but from robbing certain homes of daily necessities, such as clothing and shoes and under nourished children from the milk that they sorely need to sustain life?

They show only one page of the ledger, for on the other page, there is listed lost souls broken homes, cost of maintaining courts, poor health and unhappiness. When you take all this in consideration, where is the profit?

Do we not read in Matthew 16:26 where Jesus said: For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?

In summing up let me say that if we would only keep before us the fact that our bodies are the Temple of the Lord and that all that we do here in this life should be done to the glory of God.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Education without Christianity is a failure, but how may Christianity be learned unless it is taught? One may attain a vast amount of knowledge, but unless his heart is consecrated to the service of the Master, his life will have been spent in vain. We find that in almost every instance a person who has been reared by christian parents, or told about God and His love by his Sunday School teacher, is more easily won to Christ than those who have had no such previous teaching.

The whole purpose of Christian education is to lead others to Christ and to train them for service. We have some wonderful agencies for these purposes in our church organizations. These organizations, however cannot function properly without thoroughly trained, consecrated Christian leaders. Where shall we find such leaders?

The first place we think of is our Baptist institutions. In almost every community in our association we find graduates of such colleges as Mrs Hill, Wake Forest, and Meredith, who are ably filling responsible positions in our churches, society, and businesses. These schools provide a religious atmosphere through Bible study, personal service, and other means which is apt to be lacking in other institutions. We Baptists ought to consider it a privilege to contribute to the Christian training of our youth by supporting Baptist Colleges in every possible way.

Study courses should be held in our churches as often as possible. They are a helpful and inspiring source of training for leadership.

Too often Baptist homes contain little or no religious literature. Now as never before it is imperative that our children have good reading material. We cannot allow the ideals of American youths to become so distorted as those of our Axis enemy. It is important that we be informed of the international conflict and it is more important that a Christian attitude be maintained. There are numerous religious periodicals and books which will help build character, establish Christian ideals, and strengthen faith. It is up to us to provide them.

Let us, then, cooperate fully in an effort to promote Christian education in our homes, church organizations, religious literature, and especially our Baptist schools.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

A Sunday School is the Church at work teaching people, young and old, the Bible and its fundamental principles in the Christian way of life. If our boys and girls are ever taught the Bible it will have to be done in the different churches of the Association. If they are ever to be won to Christ it will have to be done largely through the efforts of some good Sunday School teacher. We would like to beg of each pastor in the Transylvania Association to see to it that our boys and girls are supplied with the very best of Christian teachers.

We fear that too many of our teachers in this particular day are not spiritually qualified to teach. We believe that this one thing is responsible for so many of our young people drifting with the tide in our world today. The crying need of today is better trained, better equipped, and more consecrated leadership.

We have made progress in some of our Sunday Schools this year. In others we have not even scratched the surface. There has been so much to be done—yet we have done so little. Let us all put forth a more earnest effort this year than we did last to make our schools better.

Please let me urge you superintendents, teachers and all other officers to attend our monthly Associational meetings more. You have a part in these meetings and if you are not there they will not be what they should. There were twelve of these meetings held this year with an average attendance of 60 people. Average attendance of schools, 11. Average attendance of pastors, 7. Average attendance of superintendents, 8. The average enrollment of all schools last year was 2457. The average enrollment this year, 1383. The average attendance last year 1474. The average attendance this year, 969. At present there is one standard Sunday School in the Association. Two lack only two points and three lack three points of being standard. Three churches have had training schools this year with 34 awards.

We have training centers all over our land to train our boys to destroy life. Surely we need to train those that are left with us to save life. I know of no other place to do this other than in our Sunday Schools. So why not put on a program of training among the youth of the Transylvania Association.

## REPORT ON DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

I wish these people could be in a near Vacation Bible School themselves. They need it and need to see that all children are in one. It is not a place of play. It is a place of study which the children all love. They have an opportunity to study the Bible in a different way from which they have in Sunday School, which they will not forget.

From year to year we should work the harder to see that we have a school in every church in the association. Mr. Homer L. Grice, Secretary of Vacation Bible School, Nashville, said to the associational superintendents that we are missionaries to the boys and girls of our association. You pastors and Christian people of each church, you are the missionaries if you have a Vacation Bible School for your boys and girls. It helps to get them to church and Sunday School. It makes better boys and girls. Many are led to Christ right in the Bible School. This year 30 were saved.

Through our State Sunday School Secretary, Mr. L. L. Morgan, it has been made possible for us to have a worker each year which has been very satisfactory as our schools are growing better each year

In several of the churches this year the enrollment has not been as high as last year, due to contagious diseases, transportation, and labor shortage.

In our association we had 14 schools last year, with an enrollment of 906. This year 13 schools with an enrollment of 786.

#### REPORT ON BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

EVERY CHURCH WITH A LIGHT SHINING THROUGH ITS WINDOWS ON SUNDAY EVENING . . . Is this goal too big to set for our association, even though many churches do not have evening services every week? No, I do not think so. If church members would find their places in the Baptist Training Union and work as hard there as in organizations in which they have the leadership, we would have 27 Training Unions for all members of the family rather than 10 Training Unions for only part of the age groups. One Baptist pastor has said that the Training Union is like a wheelbarrow. It stands still unless some one pushes it. The Training Union is a peculiar wheelbarrow, too, because it goes better when the pastor pushes it.

The Training Union is the church membership in training. How many church members would be willing to send their boys into a fierce battle without having any military training, whatsoever? Not any. Yet how little we consider the importance of training our people in the great army of Christ. How many boys and girls, men and women, do we enlist in the Sunday School, teach the Bible, and win to Christ, but then forget that they need to be trained? If the army of our country needs training, then consider how necessary it is that the Christian soldiers be trained! A very prominent Baptist minister has said that "the church that doesn't train its leaders will

How many of our Sunday night services would be a failure if it were not for the Training Union? How many of you with an ill-nurtured, lame and limping "Young People's meeting" have the same kind of evening preaching service? The Baptist Training Union is not merely for young people but it is for the whole family—the Story Hour through the Baptist Adult Union.

Through the Training Union of the various churches in the association, people have been strengthened. We have remembered our men in service in various ways. New hymns have been learned, thus improving the worship services of our church. May we all take advantage of the Department of Church Music of the Sunday School Board in its effort to help in the improvement of the music program in all our churches. Learn the beautiful words of our hymn for August, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross."

Our quarterly mass meetings have been well attended and worthwhile. As we plan for another year in our association let us remember our scripture verse for this year, "For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world; and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. (1 John 5:4).

As we plan new building additions to our churches in the association, let us remember the Training Union in these plans. These buildings are wrongly called Sunday School buildings. They should be called educational buildings and should be made available to all departments of the church.
