# **PROCEEDINGS**

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING

- 1. The sixty-third annual session of the Transylvania Baptist Association met with the Middle Fork Baptist Church on August 9 and 10, 1944, with T. C. Henderson Moderator, presiding.
- 2. Lloyd Cantrell, song director, led in singing "Toiling On." Rev. B. W. Thomason, pastor of Brevard First Church, conducted devotional.
  - 3. Messengers to the Association were enrolled.
- 4. The moderator read the names of D. H. Orr, Miss Lorena Merrill, Mrs. Seldon Jones, Rev. W. S. Price and Gaston Whitmire as committee on committees.
- 5. J. A. Glazener presented and discussed report on the cooperative program. The Rev. J. C. Pipes discussed the work of the cooperative program.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

#### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM By J. A. GLAZENER

The Cooperative Program continues to grow in favor, because it is sane, scriptural, educational and economical. It seeks to enlist all our people in the systematic, cheerful and adequate support of all our work.

The Southern Baptist Convention will celebrate the one hundredth

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anniversary of its organization May, 1945. A great program is being prepared and a Centennial Crusade is being launched seeking to complete, celebrate, climax and crown the century for Christ.

To help realize these high and holy objectives all churches and people are called upon:

- 1. To magnify the Cooperative Program for the financial support of our work.
- 2. To make the Centennial Crusade with all its objects state, southwide and world-wide a matter of constant prayer and effort.
- 3. To observe the special days and season as listed in the Calendar of Denominational Activities.
- 4. To put on the Every Member Canvass prayerfully, patiently, seeking to enlist all our people in the larger support of all our work.
- 5. To stress Christian stewardship, and to enroll as tithers all who will contribute at least one-tenth of their net income to the Lord's work.

Last year, 1943, the Undesignated Cooperative Program receipts stepped up around 25% over the previous year. Now, in 1944, they are up more than 20% over last year so far this year. We are indeed gratified with this increase.

The Baptist State Convention has set a goal for itself in 1945 of One Million Dollars through the Undesignated Cooperative Program. This means a million dollars in addition to any designated gifts to the different mission objects, the Orphanage, Hospital and our educational institutions.

We know pretty well what each Association and each church must give if we are to reach the goal which has been set. Therefore, we call upon you to study carefully the amount suggested for each church in your Association. Then we earnestly urge you to challenge your church to reach the goal. Of course any church is free to set a higher or lower goal than the one suggested.

Goals suggested are for associational year 1944-1945 or for calendar year 1945. Amount shown as given in 1942-1943 is taken from the 1943 report to the Association and printed in the Convention Annual.

6. D. H. Orr presented and discussed the report on religious literature. Other speakers on the report were the Rev. J. A. Anderson and Dr. J. C. Owen.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

It is vitally important that we, as a Baptist people, see to it that our homes are well provided with religious literature. Our young people are going to read something, so why not keep religious literature before them at all times?

The Bible—the Book of Books—God's Holy Word, without question, heads the list of all religious literature. The great need of today among our Baptist people is a more systematic reading and studying of the Bible. The "old family Bible" is seldom read any more, so we would suggest that every member of every family have an individual Bible. Provide the children with Bibles that they can call their own. Get an attractive looking Bible, one with good binding, printed on good paper—one of convenient size. Pay a good price for it and get one the owner will be proud to possess, proud to carry to Church and Sunday School. This will promote reading and study. If you want one with "helps," be sure to get it from the Baptist Sunday School Board or from one of our Baptist Book Stores. "Thy Word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin against thee."

Another great need of today among our Baptist people is information concerning our denominational program of work in the Kingdom of God. This information can be had by all if we would read our de-

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nominational papers and magazines. We are grateful for what our pastors and Church leaders have done to promote this cause, but all of our pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, B. T. U. leaders and W. M. U. leaders should continue to stress the importance of every Baptist family subscribing to and reading our religious papers and periodicals. Or better still, let each Church provide for this in their budget and supply every member with the literature needed.

We are happy to report that the Biblical Recorder, our State paper, has had a substantial increase in circulation during the past year, and it is hoped this growth will continue. It is the aim to make the Recorder both a good, wholesome, attractive weekly that will be of interest and help to the whole family circle; and a solid substantial denominational journal; and we feel since it is the organ of our Baptist State Convention and because of the service it will render, it ought to be in every Baptist home. "Charity and Children," the Orphanage paper, should go into every Baptist home. Besides being interesting reading for the entire family, it gives a weekly and also a quarterly statement of all gifts from all churches in the State to the Orphanage.

Another need is a well selected and well stocked Church library, and a competent Librarian in every Church. Our Sunday School board has a plan by which several good books may be obtained free of charge by any Church starting a new library. These can be supplemented from time to time as needed and will do much to promote wholesome reading among our young people. Any Church can have a good library if they want it.

Another need is an extension department in every Sunday School. This department will keep our "shut-ins" and our young men who are in service supplied with literature especially adapted to them.

A Baptist Book store catalogue should be kept in every Baptist home. From this catalogue good books of all kinds from Bibles on down may be selected and brought as needed. When you buy this way, you are safe and the Baptist denomination deserves our patronage.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

9. The session opened by singing "Precious Name." A. M. Paxton led devotional.

10. N. L. Ponder read report on hospitals. Following the report Rev. Charles E. Parker, pastor of the hospital at Winston-Salem, brought a message on the work of the hospital.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

#### REPORT ON HOSPITALS

Many Baptists of North Carolina are showing their pride in our hospital at Winston-Salem. The number of churches contributing to this work is increasing in our own association. Pastors and other workers should teach our church members more about this splendid institution. Helping sick, diseased and suffering humanity was in Christ's program and we should take pride in the privilege of helping carry on this program.

Our hospital has a 20 years' splendid record of service, treating 67,000 patients, of which number 19,000 were mothers who were returned to 58,500 children. In this period 1,585 ministers, missionaries and ministerial students have had treatment. In this 20 years 25,400 service or free patients received help. The cost of this free service was \$2,206,500. In 1943 the largest number of patients for any year had hospital service. There were 7609 received into the hospital, 2,724 were examined and treatment prescribed, and 8,800 seen in the private clinic, making a total of 21,133.

A very wise move was made in placing the Wake Forest School of Medicine at the hospital. The school now gives a full four years' course and provides for 200 medical students. It graduated its first class in 1943

The hospital has a staff of 75 doctors composed of specialists equipped to meet the needs of any condition of sick humanity.

The school meets all the requirements of a standard training school for nurses, both of the state and the federal government. Also, the school emphasizes the highest ideals of christian service. The school enrolls 105 student nurses, and the hospital has 43 graduate nurses.

The Duke endowment fund pays \$1.00 a day for each service patient. Last year this fund was \$26,899, the Mothers' Day offering, \$72,584.08 and linens from W. M. U. organizations, \$2,598.70, totaling \$102.081.78.

The hospital receives patients of any denomination, those for whom our doctors think something can be done for relief or cure not merely for nursing.

The hospital presents a real spiritual atmosphere, and has done a real spiritual service in employing the Rev. Charles E Parker as full time hospital pastor. This pastor makes daily visits to the patients, teaches Bible in the nurses' training school and ministers in every way possible to patients and their families as they visit the hospital. This service has been made possible by Mr. C. M. Scott, of West End Baptist Church of High Point, who pays the entire salary of this pastor.

The administrator expresses the deepest appreciation for the fine cooperation of pastors in their efforts to get patients into the hospital during this period of war strain. The hospital will gladly supply any information and furnish any help possible to give.

11. The moderator read report on Christian education as prepared by Helen Owen. Prof. J. H. Satterfield, of Mededith college, and Prof. M. H. Kendall, of discussed the report.

The report was adopted by vote.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Ever-expanding opportunities for Christian service in a destitute world magnify the responsibility resting upon Homes, Churches, Colleges and Seminaries to develop and maintain an adequate Christian leadership.

Mars Hill, Wake Forest, Meredith Colleges and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, in these crucial days of change and confusion, reaffirm their absolute devotion to the Bible as the Word of God, to Jesus Christ as the only Savior of men, to the New Testament pattern of the Church, to preaching and teaching as the divinely given means of accomplishing the purpose of Christ, and to the Kingdom of God as the only ideal making possible a just and enduring peace.

God is moving mightly upon the hearts of many of our young men and women and calling them into His service and hoping upon these the security for full preparation. This is an hour of vast opportunity and responsibility for Baptists and it is not strange that God should be getting ready, soldiers of Christ, for the greatest warfare of all the battles against sin and unbelief.

Our Homes and our Churches should see that our young people read good literature and have the best training possible. Every Church should have at least one training course a year for their young people.

The Seminary last year enrolled approximately 600 Ministers, of whom 126 received their degrees in the spring, to go out as pastors, missionaries, evangelists, chaplains, etc. Because the record enrollment taxed the physical plant, the students studied under grave handicaps, the most serious being the lack of adequate living quarters. Many families found it necessary to leave them elsewhere and take rooms in the men's dormitory. Our need of the hour is for additional

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buildings and equipment to accommodate the students seeking the training which we offer.

The success of the Seminary in meeting its responsibility in the field of theological education depends, in the final analysis, upon the support of the churches. Three things the churches can do:

- 1. Encourage young men called of God to the Gospel ministry to secure the best possible training in college and seminary.
- 2. Aid them financially during the lean years when they are securing their training.
- 3. Keep in touch with them and re-locate them back where they are most needed, after they have completed their training.

#### HELEN OWEN

12. Mrs. E. H. Davis read the report on orphanage. Dr. I. G. Greer, Superintendent of the Mills Home Orphanage, spoke on the work of the orphanage.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

The Baptist Orphanage of N. C. is incorporated and was formerly known as the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage and later as the Mills Home and the object of the institution is the support and caring for and training of dependent children of the white race.

Mr. I. G. Greer is general superintendent and Mr. R. D. Covington is treasurer, with office located on the Mills Home grounds at Thomasville, N. C.

The orphanage maintains two homes, the Mills Home in Thomasville and the Kennedy Home near Kinston. These are not two orphanages, but are the two homes of the Baptist Orphanage. Each of the homes has a superintendent, but the funds of the home are handled by one treasurer. Miss Sarah E. Elmore is superintendent of the Mills Home and Rev. W. C. Reed is superintendent of the Kennedy Home.

Miss Hattie Edwards is director of the social service department and handles all applications for the entrance of children into the home and after investigation makes recommendation to the general superintendent, who makes the final decision. He says whether the child is to be accepted and if so into which home. If it seems best the child is placed in a boarding home or establishes a mothers aid home.

During the year 1943 the orphanage cared for a total of 614 children—531 in the two homes, 23 in boarding homes and 60 in their own homes.

Attendance in school reached almost 99%, due to the general good health of the children and the almost total absence of any contagious diseases.

As a result of good food, regular hours and the cooperation of all

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workers, the health of our children is far above that of the outside population.

Many activities are involved in the production of good food. The farm from which we receive fresh vegetables in abundance along with pork and beef, the dairy from which each child receives a quart of whole milk daily, the poultry yard where all of our chickens and eggs are produced and the one hundred thousand half gallon jars that are filled with every kind of fruit and vegetables by our friends all over North Carolina.

All of these good things are sent out to our nineteen kitchens of the two homes where they are prepared as well balanced meals under the supervision of trained workers.

Clothing to a great extent is made by the children, with the aid of competent supervisors.

More than ten thousand pieces pass through the two laundries each week. The greater part of this work is done by the girls, colored help is employed for the heaviest of labor.

The physical education program goes on the year round with trained directors in charge.

A graded Sunday school, B. T. U. and W. M. U. both at Kennedy Home and Mills Home help in rounding out the lives of our boys and girls.

Charity and Children is published each week at the Mills Home and covers the entire activities of the orphanage. Along with the paper a profitable commercial printing shop is maintained and large numbers of our boys are trained.

The greatest asset of the orphanage are the many friends who love it. The Thanksgiving offerings taken each year by the churches throughout the state are the most heartening and uplifting thing in a financial way that has ever come to our orphanage life. The continuation of the monthly offerings from the Sunday school climaxed by another Thanksgiving offering as good or better than the one last year will make it possible for us to meet the demands being placed upon us in these strenuous times.

We must never lose sight of one of the chief purposes of the orphanage and that is the making of worth while men and women out of dependent boys and girls.

It is more blessed to give than to receive and Jesus said: "Whatsoever ye do unto one of the least of these little ones, ye do it also unto Me."

13. Session adjourned to meet Thursday morning.

#### THURSDAY MORNING

14. A. M. Paxton led singing. The Rev. S. B. McCall conducted devotional.

15. Dr. J. C. Owen, acting in place of A. E. Hampton, deceased, had prepared and read the report on Temperance and Morals. Dr. Owen and the Rev. J. T. Hall discussed the report.

The report was adopted by vote.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

Some of the essentials of Good Citizenship are honesty, truth, industry, intelligence, frugality, purity of manhood and womanhood, good schools, good homes, good churches and good laws rightly enforced. The beverage liquor traffic is an enemy to and tends to destroy every one of these. It makes no contribution toward anything that is good, but fosters and promotes every evil known to man.

The beverage liquor traffic is doing more to hinder and retard our victory over our Axis enemies than any other force. It occupies the time of men and women whose labor is needed for the prosecution of the war; it uses up food stuffs and machinery which are needed for saving our boys from death; it produces absenteeism and disqualifies the workers who are needed to produce the equipment our boys need to combat the Germans and Japs. It uses up the sugar and other materials needed in our hospitals and for our boys in the trenches. But it makes no contribution toward victory.

The traffic is utterly selfish. It seeks to get money from the unfortunate drinkers without giving any benefit in return. Prohibition was repealed through the influence of rich millionaires in the north who wished to avoid the legitimate taxes on their immense fortunes and have these taxes paid by the poor unfortunate men and women who often let their little children starve in order that they may buy their liquor. Yet for nearly twelve years the legislatures of North Carolina have refused the people of this state the privilege to vote on the question of legalized liquor within our bounds.

Your Committee recommends that this Association go on record as follows:

First: That we will not patronize the beverage liquor traffic at any time or in any degree, but will fight the traffic till it is destroyed from the earth.

Second: That we request and demand of the next legislature of North Carolina that they enact the necessary legislation to submit the whole question of the legalization of the making and sale of liquor in this state to a vote of the people of the state.

#### W. M. U. REPORT

We are all aware of the fact that the year 1943 was one of uncertainty, anxiety and sacrifice, because of the great tragedy of war in which we find ourselves. Many changes have come in our way of life, in our homes, churches and societies, but our "faithful few" have been loyal.

We want to "give honor to whom honor is due." Our Superintendent, Mrs. S. F. McAuley, and her associate have led our Woman's Missionary Union in a most efficient manner. While all our goals have not been reached and all our hopes have not been realized, we "Praise God from whom all blessings flow" for the faithful and untiring efforts of our associational officers.

We, the members of the Woman's Missionary Union of Transylvania Association, as "Laborers together with God," wish to submit the following report:

We have 11 Woman's Missionary Societies and 16 Young Peoples Organizations.

The gifts from these, from July, 1943, to July, 1944, amount to \$1,408.63.

Outstanding work was the four associational meetings. In September a State Mission program was given with Mr. Ludlum as speaker. Eight churches were represented. In January an Associational Conference was held, with representatives from 10 Societies. In March an Associational Mission Study was held, in which 6 Societies participated. At our Annual Meeting, in May, all associational officers were present. A day of information and inspiration was enjoyed by delegates and visitors from 9 Societies.

Despite the changes, trying circumstances and handicaps, our reports show slight gains in gifts and organizations. We are rejoicing over past opportunities as "Laborers together with God," and pray that we may do greater things for Him. "That the generation to come might know."

17. A. M. Paxton read the report on Sunday schools as prepared by J. W. Glazener, who was absent. A. M. Paxton, Mrs. J. C. Owen and Sunday school Superintendent, Fred Montieth, discussed the report.

I wish I knew how to write a letter to the association on this great subject. To have a thorough knowledge of the work done by the different Sunday schools over the county, the writer on Sunday school work ought to visit each school, but this would take about six months to do so, which would be hard for any one to do and to the part we should do in our own church, so off handed we write from time to time on the different branches of our church work over the county, and each time looking forward to seeing our church and Sunday school work in better shape than the year just past. We older ones realize what it meant to us when we were children to attend Sunday school. We appreciate those by gone days of our old faithful Sunday school teachers, they have gone to their reward and we are trying to take their places the best we can. Are we interested in the church work as we should be? I fear quite a number of our leaders and members have fallen by the wayside by not going out after the people who are not attending church and Sunday school and give them a hearty welcome to come to church. We are facing today a great shortage all over the county in our young men's classes. They have been called into service for their country. They are defending the rights and privileges of our country that we are enjoying today. Are we doing our part in keeping the home fires burning by doing all we can to enlist our young people into God's service? I for one feel that I have not done what I could as superintendent in trying to enlist all who are not attending church and Sunday school to do so. By doing this we would fill the vacancies caused by our young men and girls who grow up and leave our churches either to enter college or work away from home. By their absence we get disheartened and lose the interest in the church and Sunday school work as we should. All our Sunday schools over the county are having the same experience in church work since war was declared. Some are doing real fine work under conditions -others are not doing their best. I fear that the superintendents and pastors are responsible for a lot of the shortage in number of our

Our Associational Superintendent, Mr. Fred Montieth, has been very faithful in doing all he could to get all the Sunday schools over the county to meet once a month to study all the best information in Sunday school work and plan to help each individual Sunday school if they wanted help. His work has been hard in a way, not that he did not like to do what the association wanted him to do, but the lack of cooperation by most of the churches in the county. As we enter the new associational year, let us do it with a determination that we will by God's help do our very best to make our Sunday schools all over the county grow in the coming year as they never have heretofore.

#### STATE OF CHURCHES

It is impossible to make an intelligent report on conditions of the churches unless we had the reports from all the churches from last year's minutes. I find that there were 21 churches in the association that have no Training Unions. Ought not somebody feel the responsibility that the young people in these churches be trained for the Master's service? In a few of our churches we don't even have a Sunday school, and only eleven out of 28 have a woman's missionary union. Who is going to pray and give to missions in these churches?

A few of our churches have made some progress. They have enlarged their program, built better houses of worship, and have gone to half or full time services. They have secured a better trained minister, and increased their contributions to all objects of the convention.

Yet a majority of the churches seem to be satisfied to coast along in the same old way. When our Baptist people become well informed as to the spiritual condition of the church, and the teaching of the Bible on stewardship, evangelism and benevolence they will more heartily enlist in the work that pertains to the advancement of the Kingdom of Christ.

Just a few members in every church are expected to carry on the work. When we get every person that belongs to the church to feel that they have a responsibility and obligation to the church that they alone can fill, when every member stands in his place around about the camp, we will be able to win the battle over the world, the devil and the flesh.

#### REPORT ON DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

In thinking of Vacation Bible Schools, we are thinking of teaching the boys and girls of our church and community the Bible. To my mind if ever there was a time we should be interested in teaching the Bible it is now. Each year we should become more interested in them and their spiritual welfare as they will be the men and women of tomorrow. Let us train them in such a way that they may be more able to serve the Lord than we of today.

If the parents of the county should have been more interested in the spiritual guidance of their children, our Vacation Bible Schools would have had a much larger enrollment. It is time you parents and we church workers wake up. Why not begin making plans for a Bible School next year. A teacher of the public school once said, "We teach the children the three Rs. It is left to the church to teach the children the way of the Lord."

For our hand work this year we took as a project, with the girls, to make some of the much needed linens for our County Hospital in Brevard. The following articles were made: 33 pillow cases, 73 tray covers, 17 hot water bottle covers, 40 dish towels, 1 pot holder, 2 Metabolism covers, 1 Fluoroscope cover and 1 Alpine light cover. A total of 168 pieces. (I wish to state here, most of these were made from feed sacks. The superintendent of the hospital was consulted ahead of time as to the most needed articles, with their dimensions, that children could make from this material.)

Thirteen churches had Vacation Bible Schools this year. Five others were scheduled for schools, but due to the Polio epidemic these were called off. We were glad to have Blue Ridge, Dunn's Rock and Rocky Hill join our V. B. S. Band.

#### REPORT ON RESOLUTIONS

The committee in behalf of the Association, expresses thanks to the Middle Fork Church for the wonderful and gracious hospitality extended the delegates and other members that make up the Association. Too, we want to thank Mr. Dewey Burton for the melons furnished for the lunch hour the first day of the meeting.

Be it resolved that we follow the program of the Southern Baptist Centennial Crusade as far as possible in its 5 points namely:

- 1. EVANGELISM: "Everyone win one." There should be pastoral, personal, protracted and perennial evangelism in every church with every member participating.
- 2. EDUCATION: "Every Baptist an intelligent Baptist." Christian education should begin in the home; there should be family altars and religious training; our Sunday school should be real schools; our pulpits should have educational as well as evangelistic ideals. We should stress Bible study, Baptist history, principles, organization and program. There should be study courses, mission schools, stewardship institutions, etc. We should promote the circulation of clean literature, religious books, state papers, mission magazines, etc.
- 3. ENLISTMENT: "All our people in all our work." All our people should be informed about all our work and then enlisted in the intelligent, systematic, adequate and cheerful support of all our work.
- 4. REHABILITATION: "Thou shalt be called the repairer of the breach." World War II has well nigh broken and bankrupted the world financially and morally. The only hope of a better world is in Christ.
- 5. STEWARDSHIP: "Good stewards of the manifold grace of God." Some of our people think we should tithe as a matter of law, others think we should do it as a matter of grace; and yet others think we should do it as a matter of law and grace.

We also recommend that each church represented at this meeting go home and take some steps to curb the breaking of the Sabbath by daily labor.
