PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY MORNING

1. The sixty-fourth annual session of the Transylvania Baptist Association met with the Rocky Hill Baptist Church at Cedar Mountain on Aug. 8 and 9, 1945, with T. C. Henderson, Moderator, presiding. Rev. B. W. Thomason introduced Col. F. N. K. Bailey, of Sebring, Fla., who gave the devotional. Jerry Burns, choir director of the Rocky Hill Church, led the song "Revive Us Again."

2. Mrs. Wm. C. Morris read report on Religious Literature. Dr. F. M. Royall and L. L. Carpenter discussed the report. Dr. Royall introduced a book he had written and Brother Carpenter made a strong appeal for the Biblical Recorder, the State Baptist paper.

The report was adopted by vote after discussion.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

It is of vital importance that we as Baptists see to it that our homes are well supplied with wholesome reading which must be

Christian religious literature. We all know most assuredly that our young people will read something, and if we fail to provide them the right kind of reading material, then, of course, they will very probably read something of the wrong type. So, does it not behoove us to see to it that they have the right kind of literature at all times? In this way we are doing our part in helping them to build clean, Christian characters. "As a man thinketh, so is he in his heart."

The Bible, God's Holy Word, has always been and will continue to be the book of all books. It should head the list of all books. There are also many religious books that should be in a church library. Not enough churches have libraries.

We need to have a better knowledge of our Baptist work. This information is found in our denominational papers and magazines. A splendid plan would be to provide for these periodicals in the church budget.

There is a great need for each church to have a well stocked library, with a competent librarian. Some churches are beginning this much needed service. The Baptist book store is a good source from which to secure religious books.

3. Mrs. E. H. Davis read report on the Orphanages. Dr. I. G. Greer, Superintendent of the Mills Home Orphanage at Thomasville, gave a discussion in which he stressed mostly the need of bettering home conditions in the church communities.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGES

The orphanage maintains two homes, the Mills Home in Thomasville and the Kennedy Home near Kinston. These are not two orphanages, but are the two homes of the Baptist orphanage. Each of the homes has a superintendent, but the funds of the home are handled by one treasurer. Miss Sarah E. Elmore is superintendent of the Mills home and Rev. W. C. Reed is superintendent of the Kennedy home.

During the past year, in spite of the tremendous increased cost of living, we cared for approximately 700 children in the Mills Home and Kennedy Home, through mother's aid and in boarding houses. In addition to this, orphanage representatives rendered perhaps their best service to more than 300 children, by helping families work out their domestic problems, thus preventing the necessity of having to take these children into the institution. Through these faithful efforts more than a thousand children were aided.

It costs \$675.00 a day to care for the large family now in the or-

phanage. We cannot build orphanages large enough to care for all and mothers, and prospective fathers and mothers to re-dedicate themselves to the task of building good homes. Wrecked homes are the greatest tragedies of the present generation. We win military victories in vain, at the expense of our fine boys and girls, unless we here at home win moral and spiritual victories that will unshackle the children of tomorrow.

Charity and Children reports an all-time high in their circulation. They are now sending out 34,500 copies each week. needy children. Christian people should in some way stimulate fathers

In the school, all boys from the eighth grade up are taking vocational agriculture and farm shop work. The girls of corresponding age take vocational home economics. Shorthand and typing are taught in the junior and senior years. Vocal or instrumental music is given to every child, and a good band serves at home and elsewhere. All of these, combined with the practical work the children do on the farm, in the dairy, the printshop, the laundry, the sewing rooms and in the homes afford a degree of well rounded training and equipment.

In the church there were 31 baptisms and five received by letter. The Mills Home gave to all causes in 1944, \$60,070.89, the largest amount ever contributed by our people. Of this \$3,826.86 went to missions and benevolences, and \$2,244.03 to church expenses.

As a result of good food, regular hours and the co-operation of all workers, the health of our children is far above that of the outside population.

Clothing to a great extent is made by the children, with the aid of competent supervisors.

The greatest asset of the orphanage is the many friends who love it. The Thanksgiving offerings taken each year by the churches throughout the state are the most heartening and uplifting thing in a financial way that has ever come to the orphanage life. The continuation of the monthly offerings from the Sunday School climaxed by another Thanksgiving offering as good or better than the last one will make it possible for us to meet the demands being placed upon us in these strenuous times.

We must never lose sight of one of the chief purposes of the orphanage and that is the making of worth while men and women out of dependent boys and girls.

It is more blessed to give than to receive and Jesus said: "Whatsoever ye do unto one of the least of these little ones, ye do it also unto Me."

4. C. W. Henderson read the report on Temperance and Morals. L. A. Martin, of Lexington, and representative of the United Church League, discussed the report.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

Much of intemperate living and immoral practices among church members shun the light. If we had all the information available on the subject, we would still be unable to give an accurate report. Moreover, if we could bring to the light the actual condition, it would probably do no good, and might do harm. There is coming a time when that which is done in the dark will be seen in the light, unless it is forgiven and covered with the redeeming blood of Christ. But that time, though it seems imminent, has not yet arrived. But we already know, without much investigation, that because iniquity abounds, the love of many has waxed cold. The badge of immorality is seen in the light, in open defiance of rules of propriety and of decency and order. Profanity and drinking and tattling, together with suggestive pictures and words and gestures that are practiced or enjoyed by many church members, are the prevailing trade-marks of undisciplined living. Unless we take hold of ourselves, in the name of Christ, and compel conformity to the principles of righteousness and truth, as it is in Christ, there is hardly any hope left us that we will ever again regain the ground we have lost, or see conditions much improved over that which we now face in this wicked, warring world.

"Only better deeds can bring a better day."

Reports and speeches won't do it. We must never give up the fight against liquor, but in the meantime, and all the time, we must remember that no prohibition law of itself can save our country from the curse of liquor. There is one little grogshop that every man must close—the little grogshop just beneath the nose. Our Baptist people must know that we are guilty of the blood of our sons and daughters doomed and damned by strong drink as long as we ourselves taste or touch the stuff, or vote for it or for politicians who are themselves friendly to it.

Multitudes in our day and generation are hopelessly doomed by the drink habit. Two things we must do. First, rescue all we can from the wreckage. Second, we must look well to the next generations. The unborn millions of the children of tomorrow have certain inalienable rights. They have a right to be born and reared in at least sober homes and decent communities, and they have a right to expect the right sort of teaching and training. Then, too, they have a right to expect to live under laws that protect them from slavery worse than death.

The liquor interests are pushing their products to the extent that areas around our army camps are cesspools of drunkenness and vice, undermining our program of training and the morale and character of our armed forces.

The records of World War No. 1 show that alcohol was responsible for the undoing of the German forces; for the French had delib-

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erately left their alcoholic wares in their path when it was known that Germany was scheduled to invade France.

In fact, liquor has defeated more men, armies, and nations than any other cause.

The Amalekites won a victory over Israel and celebrated by getting drunk; then they were easily defeated. Ahab defeated Benhadad, king of Syria, while he and his men were drunk. Ninevah was destroyed by the Medes during a night of revelry. Cyrus conquered Belshazzar and 1,000 of his lords on a night of revelry. Alexander and Phillip rose to eminence and power during years when they abstained from drink. Alexander the Great conquered the world, then alcohol conquered him.

Temperance and morals are manifest self-control. The upright moral life is reached by strict discipline that will not permit one's self to indulge in degrading thoughts and actions. But such an attainment in itself is not sufficient for the abundant life. Its motive must not be primarily selfish; but must rest in the dedication of self to the principles that honor God and bless humanity. To be established in such an undertaking, with such a motive, would connect one's destiny with the enduring plan of the Eternal, and build his house on the everlasting foundations.

"The foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal: The Lord knoweth them that are His. And let everyone that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity."

We may deceive ourselves and deceive other people, but we can't fool God. He knows them that are His. We ought to be afraid to claim Christ as our Savior and continue in sin. Nay, we should be afraid to continue sinning in the holy presence of the sin-avenging God.

We read in Malachi 3:16-17, "Then they that feared the Lord spake often to one another; and the Lord hearkened and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before Him for them that feared the Lord and that thought upon His name.

"And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels; and I will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him."

Yes, the record of our lives is being kept, to the minutest detail, in the archives of heaven. And if our unclean lives remain unforgiven and uncovered, we will be condemned at the judgment seat of Christ. Our only hope is in following the life of purity in Christ. Let us all be warned, that the way of undisciplined, immoral, profane practices is the way of trouble and suffering, and of everlasting destruction. And let everyone that names the name of Christ depart from iniquity, and speak often together of the Word of Life, and think on that name as the only way to peace and love and everlasting life.

God is still on His throne and will in the end triumph over all

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sin and wickedness and works of the devil.

We long for the day when all the countries and kingdoms of this world shall become the Kingdoms of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

W. M. U. REPORT

It is with humble praise to our heavenly father than we make this W. M. U. report for the 1944 and 1945 associational year.

We are glad to report an increase in gifts though we regret a standstill in organizations.

We have had 11 woman's Missionary societies reporting during the year though one is inactive at present and a total of 16 young people's organizations. The gifts from these are as follows: Co-operative Program \$818.61, State Missions \$32.73, 100,000 Club \$61.67, World Relief \$18.57, Orphanage \$58.85, Lottie Moon Offering for World Missions \$191.51, Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions \$134.26, Baptist Hospital \$94.46, Heak Memorial Offering \$51.43, and a special offering taken at our annual meeting of \$24.00 for the building of a house of

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worship in Africa makes a total of \$1,536.09, this being an increase of \$188.46 over the previous year.

We are grateful to all our associational officers and members of Woman's Missionary Union for their fine co-operation as we have labored and continue to labor together with God to carry out His great commission of Matthew 28: 19-20.

The harvest truly is ripe and the laborers are few, may "We pray the Lord of the harvest" to send forth more laborers into the harvest, that we may win more souls in the coming year than ever before. For this is the sole purpose of Woman's Missionary Union.

Before adopting the Co-operative plan, the pastor was under-paid, and there was never enough money to meet the miscellaneous expenses in the carrying on of the church work. Since adopting this plan, the pastor is paid a good salary, and the other expenses are met with a good reserve in the treasury. Also every member has an equal chance to have a part in giving to the expense of carrying on the Lord's work.

What a great challenge we have before us and how many blessings we can obtain by helping carry on the biggest business in the world—the business that pays the best dividends. Think of the souls saved, the sick cared for, the orphans that are given homes. Then we realize that we can have a part in giving to a work which is worthy of us all. We should be faithful tithers, giving one-tenth of our income to the Lord's work. We should magnify the Co-operative Program for the support of the Lord's work.

REPORT ON B. T. U.

"I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord."—Psalm 122:1. Why do we go to the house of the Lord? For what purpose do we go there on Sunday and again on the week days? Is it to worship God, to teach, to win souls, and to have a part in the training in church membership? What a wonderful place is this house of the Lord, and what marvelous opportunity we have for magnifying Christ through the training program of our church!

How can we magnify Christ in training work? How can we help

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our fellow Baptists and others with whom we come in contact to see Christ more clearly through a program of training? Possibly, it is true that many of us are so busy with the affairs of life that we can not see or hear Christ so plainly as we should or as we once did. He is the same Christ who walked with the disciples, and who healed the sick and the blind. He is the same Jesus who asks of everyone to give of his best.

Before crossing a railroad track there are three things we are asked to do, namely: Stop, look, and listen. I think these three words can be applied to the Baptist Training Union in respect to magnifying Christ.

Stop—Let us stop long enough from the cares of the day to realize the need for training in our association. Let us stop long enough to express appreciation to those far-sighted leaders who realized that Baptists throughout the South needed a great program of training. Stop, the next time you meet Ruel Whitmire and express your appreciation to him for his splendid leadership. We have never had an association director who planned and worked any harder than Ruel has this past year. Stop to give thanks to God for the Training Union in your church, and for the leaders who are trying to carry on even amid handicaps. If you do not have a Training Union in your church, pause to analyze your situation and through the help of God get one started. During the pauses from our many duties of life, let us dedicate ourselves for a better Training Union in Transylvania Association.

Many pastors, teachers, and workers have received their inspiration from some program they have attended or in which they have participated. We would not have to look far or long to find examples of this in our own midst. Someone has said "to see is to know and to remember." So looking at our Training Union, may we know and remember its needs and results.

Listen—May we listen to God as He directs us into greater fields of service, in planning and giving better programs, and in facing the challenging opportunities as they present themselves to us daily. The Transylvania Training Union has done a great work the past year and at the present faces more opportunities for rendering real service than at any time in the past. Three challenges that come to us from the Training Union Department of the Southern Baptist Convention are: 1. "Reorganize unions, that have been disbanded because of war conditions; 2. Strengthen present organizations; and, 3. Lead churches to make an effort to enlist servicemen as soon as they return."

Now is the time to accept the challenge of magnifying Christ in our training work. May Christ be so magnified that we can say with the Psalmist, "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me and

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know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

15. Session opened by singing "Glory To His Name", led by Jerry Burns. Rev. P. L. McMahan conducted the devotional.

16. N. L. Ponder read report on the condition of churches. Rev. W. S. Price and Rev. J. W. McGuire discussed the report.

The report was adopted by vote.

REPORT ON CONDITION OF CHURCHES

Several good things can be said of the churches at this time:

1. There is a much improved spirit of co-operation in all the churches. All churches of the Association have made reports, thus showing a willingness to work in harmony and united effort. This interest is much improved over former years. For the first time in any years known the treasurer reports 100 per cent of churches paying into Minute Funds.

2. It is recognized too that more of our pastors seem more interested and take a more active part in the associational work than any previously known period.

3. Reports from pastors and other church leaders show that the spiritual interest in church attendance and work is much improved over last year.

4. Baptisms reported for the past year number 241 as compared with 118 last year, a very noticeable increase. There are noticeable increases also in membership by letter or otherwise.

5. Total gifts this year amount to nearly \$36,000, compared with about \$33,000 for last year; a gain of around \$3,000.

6. Gains in mission gifts have increased but not so much as in local gifts.

7. The total paid to state missions through the D. V. B. S. this year was \$293.56, as compared to \$94.77 last year, a gain of 300 per

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cent. Enrollment of D. V. B. S. this year was 1001 compared to 555 last year, an increase of nearly 100 per cent. This year 19 churches had D. V. B. S. over 13 last year.

8. Nine churches have added Sunday school class rooms. Four already had built class rooms. Better Sunday school and Vacation Bible schools are reported from those churches that have the necessary class rooms.

9. With a need of class room space comes also a need of training for leadership in all our churches. Better class teachers and leaders in general should be an objective in every church. All teachers need to study to "Show Thyself Approved."

17. Report on the Baptist Hospital by S. V. Brown was read and discussed. Report was adopted by vote.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL—1945

The North Carolina Baptist Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received its first patient May 28, 1923. Originally planned as a 100-bed institution, it was enlarged in 1942 to a capacity of 247 beds and 55 bassinets.

The underlying purpose of the Baptist Hospital has always been medical care for the poor. Since the day it received its first patient it has offered a high type of hospital care on a statewide basis. Its caliber of service was enhanced many times over when the Wake Forest Medical School became a four-year school in 1941 and was located adjacent to the Baptist Hospital. When the Baptist Hospital became a teaching hospital, its purpose became two-fold—teaching and healing, the twin endeavors of Christ.

The Baptist Hospital operates one of the fullest approved schools of nursing in the South, and at the present time has an enrollment of about 150 young ladies receiving professional training under Christian auspices. The students are selected under very high standards. These students come from all over North Carolina and represent the highest type of womanhood—mentally, physically and morally. While the most rigid scientific training is given the girls, the hospital takes great pride in the Christian and human attitude it develops in these girls.

Of the 8,000 patients admitted as bed patients each year, slightly over 4,000 of these are service patients who pay no doctor's fee, and who pay but a slight portion of their hospital expenses. During 1944 approximately 3,000 of these service patients paid absolutely nothing toward their hospital bill. It is toward the expense of these patients that the money given on Mother's Day each year is used. In addition to the free bed patients the hospital, as stated above, gives diagnostic examinations to approximately 20,000 free patients who are not admit-

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ted to the hospital each year. The cost to the hospital of free service rendered during 1944 was \$198,648.92.

The hospital has developed into one of the top ranking hospitals of our nation in the caliber of its medical work. In developing its medical program care has been taken that the spiritual atmosphere of the hospital should develop to the same measure. Emphasis is given at every turn, in its educational program, in its employees, and with its patients to the spiritual needs of all coming in contact with the hospital. The religious program is under the direction of a full-time Chaplain and Student Secretary. This fine and fruitful service is made possible in part by the generosity of Mr. C. M. Scott of High Point, North Carolina, who contributes toward the cost of the program. Due to the close touch which the nature of sickness allows the Chaplain to have with the patients, we have had many conversions and rededications in the hospital.

North Carolina Baptists have developed in their hospital one of the greatest medical centers in our country, and at the same time one of the strongest influences for the cause of Christ that exists in any land. Its huge opportunities for serving as an agency of mercy, as a means of teaching, and as a means of spreading the influence of Christ are a challenge to the generous heart of our great denomination that its program will not be restricted for lack of finances. All of its activities are operated on the highest of standards, and hence it requires a tremendous budget. It is self-supporting with the exception of its charity work, and it is for this merciful side of its program that North Carolina Baptists this year are giving over \$100,000 through the Mother's Day program.

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the church will soon be gone. Through the help of able teachers in our church our young boys and girls are led to see Jesus Christ, and their lives are made brighter by having known Him.

As to the different Sunday Schools over the county and their work for the past year, I cannot say as to how they are doing. We all realize the war conditions have made many changes in our Sunday Schools over the county. Each school has been doing what it could under conditions. I'll not say they have been doing their best, for I feel that I could have done more as Superintendent of my Sunday School and I guess others in the association feel about the same way. We who are blessed by not having to go to war can do all within our power to keep the home fires burning in our churches until peace shall once again reign in our nation. As we enter into the new associational year, let each one of us who professes to know our Blessed Savior go forward with a determination that we'll be better soldiers of the Cross in the coming year than we have in the past. If we haven't been faithful to our associational Superintendent as we could have been, and feel that there is good to be accomplished by the association meetings each month, then let us back it up, but if we feel other wise then let the association do away with it and let each church and Sunday School work out their own salvation.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

One of the most glorious chapters in Southern Baptist History is that which tells of the beginning, the development, the growth, the success, the power and influence of our Baptist Schools. For the past one hundred years some 25 to 30 thousand of our choicest young people have year by year attended these schools. War, however, has disrupted the field of higher education and is bringing our Baptist Schools to a perilous crisis. They are needed as never before, now and in the postwar period.

The Southwide Schools are The Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky; the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas; the Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans, La.; Our State Baptist Schools are Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, five Junior Colleges and Academies. We have twenty-six Baptist Senior Colleges and Universities in the south, nine Academies and twenty-two Junior Baptist Colleges. They possess now, all told, property and endowment totaling seventy-five million dollars.

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The present difficult situation is due to the withdrawal of students into the Armed Forces, the use of schools for Military Training, emphasis on "Streamlined" specialized training, decreased support due to fewer students. If we were to lose our Baptist Schools we would have no place for the training of our Ministers, Missionaries and other Christian workers. It is of immeasurable importance to be educated under Christian environment. Without competent leadership we could not maintain the great New Testament doctrines which it is our mission to propagate. In the words of Mr. Luther Rice Baptists must "Educate or Abdicate."

Definite steps for the better support of our Baptist schools are first, choice Baptist students should be turned to Baptist schools; then, the Church should be spurred to renewed efforts to put the southwide schools and the schools or school of the state on a sounder financial basis.
