### MINUTES OF THE TRANSYLVANIA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article 1. This Association shall be called the Transylvania Baptist Association.

Article 2. This Association shall meet annually Wednesday after the first Sunday in August, and be composed of ordained ministers belonging to, and members chosen annually by, the several churches belonging to this body, who, by bearing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

Article 3. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty.

Article 4. The letters from the churches shall state the number baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and died during the preceding year, and present membership, the amount paid for local church expenditures, and amounts contributed for other objects of the North Carolina and Southern Baptist Convention and this Association, and for other purposes, and such additional information as may be necessary.

Article 5. This Association recognizes Christ as the only law-giver in religion; it recognizes each church as an idependent body, and it recognizes that it has no power or authority to infringe on the internal rights of any individual church.

Article 6. The Association shall have the power to withdraw from a church that shall knowingly and wilfully depart from the orthodox principles of Christianity as taught in the New Testament, and as interpreted by regular Missionary Baptist.

Article 7. The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer and a Historian, all of whom shall be elected annually in such manner as the body may decide.

Article 8. The Clerk shall keep a faithful, accurate and intelligible record of the proceedings of the Association, and shall have the minutes published and distributed among the churches. He shall be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) out of the minute fund for his services.

Article 9. The Treasurer shall receive and pay over to the proper persons all money sent to the Association, or to him as Treasurer and shall make an annual report to the body.

Article 10. The Historian shall collect up and put in some durable form all the facts of interest of the several churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 11. There shall be an executive committee composed of the pastor and one layman from each church. Said layman to be elected annually by each church. Other members shall be associational Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Field Worker or Missionary, Treasurer, Sunday School Supt., and Directors of Lord's Acre, W. M. U., B. T. U., and D. V. B. Schools.

At the earliest possible date the Moderator shall call meeting of Executive Committee for the purpose of electing a Program, Missionary, and Finance Committee.

The Program Committee's duties shall be: (1) To co-operate with program committee of Pastors Conference, the Field Worker or Missionary, Sunday School Supt., W. M. U., B. T. U., and D. V. B. S. Directors so as to co-ordinate the Associational work. (2) Prepare, publish and promote regular and special programs of the Association.

The Missionary Committee's duties shall be: (1) In co-operation with the State Board, at the earliest possible date, employ a Field Worker or Missionary. (2) Direct and work with said Missionary in co-operation with State and Home Mission Boards. (3) In co-operation with other committees and leaders promote all phases of mission work in the association.

The Finance Committee's duties shall be to prepare the Associational budget for proposed work of the Executive Committee and secure funds for the accomplishment of the proposed program.

Article 12. Amendments to this constitution may be made at any session by a majority of those voting.

### PROCEEDINGS

### WEDNESDAY MORNING

- 1. The sixty-fifth annual session of the Transylvania Baptist Association met with the Enon Baptist Church at Enon on August 7, 1946 with Rev. B. W. Thomason, Moderator, presiding. Session opened with singing the song, "Ninety And Nine", led by A. M. Paxton of Zion Church.
- 2. Rev. W. S. Price of Mt. Moriah-Calvert Church conducted the devotional.
- 3. Delegates were enrolled by N. L. Ponder, Clerk.
- 4. Rev. B. W. Thomason, Moderator, recognized visitors.
- 5. C. W. Henderson read report on Christian Education. Report was discussed by C. W. Henderson, M. H. Kendall of Mar's Hill College and Claude F. Gaddy of Raleigh, representing Council of Christian Education.

The report was adopted by vote after discussion.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In these latter days the standard for Christian education, as also the standard for Christianity itself, seems to stop far short of the goal set by our Savior, and preserved in His inspired book, for the attainment of those that are led to enter His school. Definitely Christian Education should fit one with the spirit and the will and the ability to demonstrate the spirit and mission of Christ in his daily conduct and attitudes, and in all of his relationships. Our descriptive terms are quite adequate if they carried their original meaning. But Christian schools that are wilfully worldly, and Christian leaders that are covetous and proud, and Christian churches that pose for effect, and Christian homes, and individuals, corrupted with sin, are too numerous for "Christian" to mean much in the terms.

I turn to the report of the Education Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention at Miami and find the following:

"One central purpose guides all the actions of the Education Com-

mission: to attract and educate Christian leaders in properly planned and adequately supported and successfully administered Christian schools for a world that needs more than ever before true Christian leadership, if civilization is to survive."

Then in the Biblical Recorder of June 26, 1946 is a statement by Claude F. Gaddy, newly elected Executive Secretary of the "Council On Christian Education," created by the Baptist State Convention in 1943. The membership of this Council at present is 44 in number, and is to have charge and control of the entire program of education in the colleges and schools of the North Carolina Baptist State convention.

Briefly, the duties of the "Council" are:

- 1. To unify the program and work of the various schools.
- 2. To study their needs and allocate available funds accordingly.
- 3. To increase interest in the support of these institutions of learning, and report to the convention.

Also in the report of the Education Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention reference is made to the dropping off in enrollment in our sixty Baptist schools on account of the war, and the capacity enrollment in our seminaries and senior colleges for the past year. It shows too the total endowment of all our schools to exceed eighty-five million dollars, with Wake Forest College in the lead with three million plus.

In much of our crusading for Christian education the chief emphasis seems to be on bringing our schools up to certain standards set by non-Christian agencies, rather than on bringing ourselves and our children up to the standard set by the inspired word for the attainment of the followers of Christ. We thus face the danger of becoming more interested in polish than in principle, and more concerned about culture than about Christ.

Briefly, the principles of Christian education are set forth in two texts of God's inspired message to the world; one in Deuteronomy 6:4-9, as follows:

"Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. And these words that I command thee this day shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shall talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down and when thou risest up. And thou shall bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes. And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates."

The other text, that sums up Christian education in its fullness is found in Titus 2: 11-14, as follows:

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all

men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously and Godly, in the present world; looking for that blessed hope, and glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior, Jesus Christ; Who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works."

Here is Christian education in its essence. Whatever falls short of this falls short of the best. And whatever fails to impart these principles fails utterly.

6. Mrs. M. C. Shipman read report on orphanages. Report was discussed by Mrs. M. C. Shipman and John Arch McMillan, editor of Charity and Children.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

### REPORT ON ORPHANAGES

Our Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville is being faced with some very acute problems. Among these are: The increased cost of living, the difficulty in securing a well-equipped staff, the inability to secure materials for repairs to buildings, and the still more serious concern of how to meet the problems in the ever increasing number of broken homes. In spite of these difficulties the orphanage has had another successful year; especially from the standpoint of income.

In view of the increased cost of living, farm activities have proven to be life-savers. They have been able to produce food for about onethird less than the cost on the open market.

"Charity and Children" has had one of the best years in its history. In circulation it has reached an all-time high of 36,000 copies and has made a profit of more than \$8,000.

The results accomplished by the Social Service Department have been gratifying. These results cover the services rendered dependent and neglected children in three types of child welfare: Institutional care, foster home care, and aid in the home. With the admission of 122 new children, a total of 700 children were under the care of the Baptist Orphanage during the year.

As soon as materials are available several old buildings will be repaired as well as new buildings erected.

The schools have been more efficient than for the past few years. The daily attendance reflects the health and interest of the children in the two homes. The average attendance as a whole has been slightly above 99 per cent. Perhaps the church life and its various activities at Mills Home and Kennedy home is, and should rightly be, the most positive influence in the lives of the boys and girls.

Last year, 21 of the 28 churches of the Transylvania Association gave \$1,760.27. We pray that during the coming year every church in the association will have a part in this great work.

As we pray and give that the Baptist Orphanage may become a still greater force for good, may we be mindful of the host of neglected children and young people in our various communities. God forbid that we should close our eyes to the conditions around us. In this day when homes are breaking down and juvenile delinquency is so wide spread, is it not time for Christians to wake up? May we not be satisfied till every child has a chance to grow as Jesus grew: physically, mentally, spiritually, and socially.

- 14. Rev. J. W. McGuire read report to have article eleven of the constitution changed. Upon motion by Rev. S. F. McAuley, the association voted to make the change. (Motion was made and carried to print the constitution in the minutes again.) (Constitution printed elsewhere in these minutes.)

Upon motion by Rev. J. W. McGuire, Association voted to discontinue Promotion Committee.

15. T. C. Henderson read report on Religious Literature. Dr. F. M. Royall, Col. F. N. K. Bailey, of Sebring, Fla., and L. L. Carpenter, of Raleigh, discussed the report. Report was adopted by vote.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The best literature in the world is in the Christian Literature of the Bible. Our Bible is one indispensable book, and yet it is more than one book; it is a library of sixty-six books of history, poetry, dramaoratory, preaching, wise sayings, all basic, fundamental religious teachings.

This library should have a prominent place in every home and should be read and carefully studied daily. How many homes there are in the bounds of our association which are destitute of Bibles we do not know. We believe that the Transylvania Baptist Association should arrange to supply Bibles for all these homes during this associational year.

It is essential also that every home in our association have as regular visitors good, wholesome and attractive papers or magazines for the information, inspiration and spiritual uplift of the members of all of these homes.

Such literature is to be found in the "Biblical Recorder" and "Charity and Children." "The Commission", the Baptist World Journal of the Southern Baptist Convention, is a valuable monthly journal giving important information in regard to the Christian work that our churches are doing through the Convention in all parts of the world. Our churches should see to it that the homes of all our resident members are supplied with these valuable periodicals.

16. N. L. Ponder read report on Co-operative program. Dr. F. M. Royall of Greenville, S. C., and Earle L. Bradley of Raleigh spoke on Co-operative program work.

Report was adopted by vote after discussion.

### REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program continues to grow in favor with Southern Baptists. They have found it to be sane, scriptural, and successful.

The three primary purposes of this plan are:

- 1. To provide a regular and adequate financial support for all our denominational work, state and Southwide.
- 2. To distribute the funds to each and all causes in proportion to relative importance and need.
- 3. To enlist all our people in the intelligent and systematic support of all our work.

There is a growing conviction that funds for the permanent needs of our causes as well as their operating needs should be provided through the Co-operative Program.

The Southern Baptist Convention asks for \$10,000,000 for current and capital needs for its causes in 1947. The needs of the state causes are correspondingly great. If these are to be met through the Co-operative Program, it will be necessary for us to greatly increase, almost double, our Program offerings.

We therefore recommend:

2. That the Special Days and Seasons provided for in the Calendar of Denominational Activities be so observed as to strengthen and not weaken the Co-operative Program.

3. That at least one school of Missions and Stewardship be conducted in every church every year.

4. That in making church budgets a larger proportion be given to the Co-operative Program causes. (Perhaps every church could give 25 per cent, many 50 per cent, and some even more.)

5. That the Every-Member Canvass be put on and followed up in every church seeking to enlist every member in the larger support of every cause. (November and December is the best time in most churches.)

6. That Christian Stewardship be stressed continuously and that every church try to enroll at least one fifth of its members as tithers. Slogan: "A million Southern Baptist tithers for Christ."

7. That accurate records be kept and regular reports be made to the church showing number of contributors, number of tithers, and amount of contributions for local needs and denominational causes.

8. That all denominational funds be sent promptly each month to the state secretary-treasurer.

9. That we be co-operative in prayer as well as service and that all our people be asked to pray daily and devoutly for peace among men and nations, and for the success of our missionaries and workers at home and abroad that the kingdom of God may come and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

17. T. L. Frady read report on Baptist Hospital as prepared by D. H. Orr. T. L. Frady, Pisgah Forest and Rev. C. E. Parker of the First Church of Franklin and former chaplain at the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem discussed the report.

After discussion the report was adopted by vote.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital has had another full and fruitful year. In the past few years its facilities to care for the sick have been greatly increased. This is true for both those who do not have the money to pay for complete hospital care and those who have complicated afflictions which the hospitals and doctors in most communities are not prepared to care for.

The Out-Patient Clinic is now working in its enlarged and better equipped quarters. It is prepared to do the highest type of work of examining the sick, prescribing treatment for their ills, and giving some specialized treatments. After the examination, most of these can be treated back home by a local doctor or in a local hospital. There is now being added to the clinic additional services in psychiatry and in eye and dental diseases. The cost for an examination in the Out-Patient Clinic is \$5.00, not including X-rays and special laboratory tests, for all who are able to pay it. This just about covers the actual cost to the hospital for the examination. The charges for the X-ray pictures and special tests are estimated at actual cost. Most people are able to pay these fees. In cases where they are not able to pay the whole fee, the balance is paid out of the Mother's Day Offering.

Along with the Out-Patient Clinic, there is operated the Private ical care.

The sick who come to these clinics and need to enter the Baptist Hospital for treatment are then admitted as bed patients, in so far as room permits. Due to lack of space, it is impossible for the hospital to take care of all who need to be admitted. Because of this lack of space, our hospital has available a great deal of the finest medical skill which it is not able to use to relieve suffering.

The Mother's Day Offering enables our hospital to care for those who do not have the money to pay their full bills. Those who are able to pay in full are expected to do so, because, if they fail to, it will take help from those who are in actual need. No person who is exted to the hospital is charged any doctor's bill at all, whether or not he pays his hospital bill. More than half of those who are cared for able to pay anything at all. Our hospital does far more free service for the poor than any other denominational hospital in the South and stands among the first in America in the amount it does. Last year, this free service cost the hospital over \$167,000.00 We are happy that the Day Offering in this great service.

Our Baptist Hospital operates one of the best schools of nursing in the South. It seeks the finest young women, mentally, physically, and spiritually, to train for a Christian ministry of healing. It invites young women from our Baptist homes and churches who are interested in giving their lives to this important profession to consider going there for their training. The need for nurses is urgent! Any girl 18 years of age or over, with high school education, or better, is eligible to apply. Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

The new Department of Religion at our Baptist Hospital is being organized to render an effective spiritual ministry. This includes visita-

tion and counsel among the sick and burdened in the hospital, Bible instruction and a religious program for students, the effort to help create a Christian spirit through all the work of the hospital, and carrying to our churches the information concerning the work of our hospital. The ministry of this department is recognized by all connected with the hospital as an important part of the work.

The urgent and outstanding need of our Baptist Hospital is the construction of a new south wing. This would provide 140 new beds, which are so geatly needed, especially to care for the more seriously ill, who need private rooms. Additional operating and delivery rooms and X-ray facilities would be included. It would provide adequate kitchen and storage room, where the hospital is now seriously handicapped for lack of space. Also, it would provide room for a laundry. It now costs the hospital over \$50,000.00 a year to get its laundry done outside. The new wing would greatly increase the service of our hospital to the sick and would enable it to increase its income.

The cost of the new south wing would be close to a million dollars. One gift of \$200,000 already has been offered toward this, provided the construction is approved this year. Many who have been to our hospital as patients, or to take patients, know how badly this additional room is needed. The advisability of permitting the hospital to construct this building will be considered by our Baptist State Convention in its sessions at Asheville in November. The messengers from our association to the State Convention will have opportunity to vote their approval of this new building. We hope they will act favorably toward it.

It is to be hoped that all of our churches will liberally support this truly wonderful Agency of Mercy.
