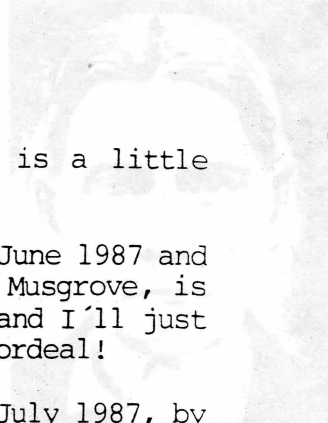

I was operated on 30 November 1986 to repair a detached retina in that eye. The operation was successful and now with new glasses I

It is ideal to play and listen to on trips as well as in the home.

I visited Dothan, Alabama, my old home town, in May 1987 and found all the family who still reside there, on both my father's and mother's side, in good health. I also visited George and Roanie Warrick in Blakely, Georgia and they were also doing fine. I will not make the reunion this year because of a commitment to visit my grandson who is graduating from boot camp at Fort Jackson, S.C. August 27, 1987 and will be moving to Arizona.

Emmett died 18 Mar. 1970 and Mabell died 18 Mar 1949. Both are buried in Falling Creek Methodist Church Cemetery. They lived in Grantham Community of Wayne County. This couple reared 11 children:

RETIRING GWALTNEY RECALLS LEGAL BEGINNING

MONTGOMERY, ALA.---Years before he was arguing cases against bank robbers and car thieves, Lewis Gwaltney recalls arguing with an old farmhand called Uncle Eli. He would stand and argue with him, and Uncle Eli would say, "Go on, boy. You ought to be a lawyer." Lewis Gwaltney, 69, looking back on a legal career that began in 1945 and ended last week when he retired after 12 years as the U.S. Magistrate in Montgomery.

Gwaltney traces the start of his career to his father's farm in Dothan, where "an old black man called Uncle Eli raised me." Gwaltney's father was a farmer and banker, who was elected tax collector during the Depression. Gwaltney remembers picking cotton and peanuts, cutting and hauling firewood on a two-mule wagon, scrubbing his grandmother's wooden floors with a corn shuck brush, and helping his father at the tax office. He says he also remembers the old man who taught him to drive a Model T. Ford at age 12.

Growing up on the farm, Gwaltney never thought at all about being a lawyer. But when he enrolled at the University of Alabama in 1937, he chose to study law, and he thinks Uncle Eli's advice probably had much to do with that choice. "I think it did", Gwaltney said, reflecting as he fills his pipe with tobacco

during an interview at his home in Prattville.

Gwaltney, son of Alvin and Bernice Warrick Gwaltney of Dothan, recalls that his father, of Welsh ancestry, saw to it that the family worshiped together on Sunday. His father also believed in using a 52-inch leather belt on his sons to reinforce discipline. Though raised Baptist, he has been a lay reader in the Episcopal church and serves on the board of elders of the First Methodist Church of Prattville, AL.

telephone when I gave the signal. I sat on the corner of the porch where I could see both Mrs. Quattlebaum and my brother. She sat down, crossed her arms and was smiling when I nodded to my brother. He gave a crank on that telephone and Mrs. Quattlebaum said, 'Humpff', and jumped a little. After a while, I nodded again, and he cranked it and she said 'Humpff', again. Then he give it a pretty good crank and she said 'Humpff, humpff' and fell out of that chair. Somebody had to help her up." Gwaltney still vividly remembers the impression that 52-inch belt made on him.

He was a senior in law school when World War II broke out and he was drafted, but his grades were good enough that he was able to get his diploma and law license approved by the American Bar Association. After the war "Dad and I spent about two months fishing, and I was toying with going to Harvard and getting my master's", he says.

Instead, he got a job as a field attorney for The Veterans Administration and later was associated with the late Birmingham attorney, Maurice Bishop. Together they acquired much of the right-of-way for U.S. 31 north of Birmingham. In January 1953, Gwaltney was named assistant U.S. attorney and headed the criminal division in the Birmingham office. He eventually served under U.S. Attorney Frank M. Johnston, Jr., who is now a judge of the U.S. 11th Circuit Court of Appeals. Gwaltney worked for former U.S. attorneys John Hill and William Longshore. "I thoroughly enjoyed prosecuting crime. I have

prosecuted everything from big whiskey cases, white slave crime, stolen autos, thefts and bank robberies", said Gwaltney.

Gwaltney also recalled working as a full-time associate professor of law at Samford University's Cumberland Law School and serving as court-appointed special master handling distribution of \$10 million in damages to survivors and families of the infamous federal Tuskegee syphilis study. While teaching law at Samford, he wrote the student practice act that allows law students to practice in Alabama courts under the supervision of a licensed attorney.

He became U.S. Magistrate in Montgomery in February 1975 and has handled numerous misdemeanor cases as well as special-master duties for the federal court since then.

He has seen American law "swing like a pendulum" from the days of U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren, "where the emphasis was on the criminals' rights, and the victims' right to life was completely ignored." Recent rulings affirming the death penalty in Georgia and holding that an accomplice does not have to pull the trigger to be guilty are "more what the law should be", Gwaltney believes.

Gwaltney, nodding to half-dozen or more fishing rods on his wall, said he has kept up with his fishing during the years, and his family "has never been more than a hug away". So he won't have much catching up to do in retirement. Instead, he'll just leave his robe in the closet, he says.

"It has been a good life ...I've enjoyed every minute of it", he said.

Families' fathers serve

Four relatives have all been recognized for being sons and daughters of Confederate veterans.

Minnie Sutton is the most recent of the four to receive a medal and certificate from the George Davis Camp No. 5, Sons of Confederate Veterans. Her father, James W. McClenny, had served in the Civil War.

The 99-year-old Wayne County

resident received the recognition from George Davis Camp representative Lee V. Conner Jr. of Wilmington. Among those in attendance were two nieces who also were recently honored and a nephew who received his recognition a few years ago.

The three are Virginia Crow of Goldsboro, Olive Mortimer of the Grantham Township and Raymond Crow of Wilmington. Also recently received into the Sons of Confederate Veterans was their brother

Needham C. Crow, who passed away last March. His recognition was accepted by his son, Needham C. Crow Jr.

"I think it's an honor to be received into this society," Mrs. Mortimer says.

Their father — Needham Crow — was 17 when he fought in the Civil War. He entered about six months before the war ended and served as a foot soldier in Company D, 67th Regiment, North Carolina Troops.

Mrs. Mortimer and Miss Crow say their father told a few war stories when they were quite young, but, because of their age then, they don't remember many of them.

"My brother and I remember him telling about a bullet striking his belt," Mrs. Mortimer recalls. "It was a thick belt, so he was not hurt."

The two women say they don't recall ever seeing a Confederate uniform, and, due to the state the South was in toward the end of the war, don't know if the military was able to provide him with one.

However, they recall, their father did have some items from the Civil War days. Among them were a canon ball their father kept on the stairway in their house, a bullet mound and a muzzle-loader gun.

Crow was 53 when he married 22-year-old Alice McClenny. Both were from the Grantham Township and spent their lives there. They had five children: Robert, who passed away in 1975; Raymond; Olive; Needham; and Virginia.

Mrs. Mortimer was 17 when her father died; Miss Crow was eight.

Several years after his death, the family found a parole their father had signed at the end of the Civil War. In the parole, which was signed by Southern soliders, Crow promised to obey the laws of the Union and abide by the Constitution.

The parole included a physical description of Crow, told where he lived and showed he had been a farmer prior to the war. The parole was signed in July 1865.

I, *Needham Crow* do solemnly swear or affirm, in the presence of Almighty God, that I will henceforth faithfully support and defend the constitution of the United States, and Union of the States thereunder and that I will in like manner, abide by and faithfully support all laws, and proclamations, which have been made during the existing rebellion, with reference to the emancipation of slaves. SO HELP ME GOD.

"Thank you for that very kind introduction (Mrs. Linn). My presence here is proof that I, too, have ancestors.

It is a distinct honor and a profound pleasure today for me to welcome you to North Carolina and 400 years of recorded history for Western Civilization. It was on the shores of our state four centuries ago last month that the first English settlers attempted the permanent colonization of America. That attempt failed, but it opened the way to the founding of our nation.

In August, we in North Carolina will observe the 400th birthday of the first English child born on this continent, Virginia Dare, climaxing a four year celebration of our heritage ... beginning with the 1584 exploratory expeditions of Sir Walter Raleigh.

As professional genealogists, you are our link to that rich heritage -- the past in which North Carolina has firmly planted on foot while it takes a giant step with the other toward a new century. This past, as our celebration of the 400th Anniversary demonstrates so clearly, is part of our present, carefully preserved and cherished, to be passed on to future generations.

It is human nature to want to know and to search for our origin. In many families, it begins as a labor of love -- as it did with my father, the Rev. Arthur Morrison Martin, searching for our family roots. His work, carefully documented in this book, "The Flemington Martins", traces our family down through eight generations.

It ties together not only our genealogical lines, but also catches the spiritual motivation and inspiring example of the early generations of the Flemington Martins, which make this book a treasury of traditions that will always bless the Martin family. The linkage discovered by him in his voyage through time is shown in this genealogical chart, "our family tree", which graces the historic Executive Mansion of North Carolina. (Gov. Martin had brought with him a copy of "The Flemington Martins" and a beautiful mounted Martin Family Tree.)

But there was more than a desire to find his family's roots that motivated my father. In a sense, it was a means of bringing distant relatives closer together to share a common heritage, and to bind them together for posterity. And in a much larger sense, it was a search to find our link to the larger and more important family of man. It is in this sense that his work transcends genealogy and reaches out to find greater meaning in our being.

Not unlike my father, many people today are searching for their family roots. We were all inspired last summer to share in celebrating the great reunion of 2,000 Descendants of Slaves of Somerset Plantation, based upon genealogical research tying them to ancestors whose very lives attested to great nobility under great duress. Here in North Carolina, this kind of task is made easier for many by one of the finest State Archies in the country. The North Carolina Genealogical Library is a treasury of family heritages.

Supplementing these vast resources are the North Carolina and Southern Historical Collections at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and the highly respected William R. Perkins Manuscript Department at Duke University.

Nowhere in America does there exist a larger vein of heritage to be mined by those who want to know about and establish their connection with the past.

We welcome you to explore the richness of these resources during your visit to Raleigh and North Carolina, and to share the pride which all North Carolinians have in the heritage of our great state.

Interestingly enough, your conference here today takes place exactly 112 years to the month that General Sherman and what we call "the Army of Northern Aggression" occupied our Capital City in his March to the Sea. Fortunately, he spared our State Capitol Building his torch, and today it stands as the finest and oldest example of Greek Revival architecture in America.

This, too, is part of our heritage -- an unbroken heritage which has been protected, preserved and valued since that day the first English colonist set foot upon the Outer Banks of North Carolina and wrote a new chapter in the history of the world.

Thank you for selecting North Carolina for your conference, and I wish all of you an enjoyable and productive visit."

(Note: The North Carolina Genealogical Society was chartered 19 June 1974 by the Secretary of State, and was formally organized 1 July 1974. The list of charter members includes Mary Williamson Warrick, wife of Woodley C. Warrick.)

IDENTIFICATION OF JOB WARRICK, SR. AND HIS BROTHERS

The following deed, which was located in Book 22, pp 443,444 in the courthouse of Northampton County, Jackson, N.C., clearly shows that Job Warrick, Sr. of Wayne County and his brothers inherited land in Northampton County. Their father, Benjamin Warrick, purchased 100 Acres from Thomas Doles, both from Northampton Co., N.C. for fifty pounds on 19 June 1897. This find was the first information identifying Job and his brothers, John, Thomas and Willie, as having at least been in Northampton County, bordering the Virginia state line. The Census tells us that he was born in Virginia.

That the said John Warrick and Thomas Warrick & Job Warrick & Wilie Warrick for and in consideration of the sum of seventy five dollars to us in hand paid by the said Ev^{rt} Stancell, the receipt & wharves is hereby acknowledged have bargain sold and confirmed unto the said Ev^{rt} Stancell his heirs and assigns forever one certain tract or parcel of land containing seventy five acres more or less situated and lying in the County of Northampton, North Carolina on the main road leading from Northampton Court house to Branches' Bridge - bounded as follows beginning at Crumpler corner pine running a line of marked trees to a corner Spanish Oak in E Stancells, thence a line of marked trees to the road, thence along the said road to a point near R Bycock shop, thence a line of marked trees to the first station to have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land with the appurtenances, thence unto belonging unto the s^d Ev^{rt} Stancell his heirs and assigns forever And the s^d John Warrick & Thomas Warrick Job Warrick & Wilie Warrick for themselves, their heirs and administrators doth promise and grant to & with the said Everett Stancell his heirs and assigns by these presents that the s^d John Warrick, Thomas Warrick & Job Warrick & Wilie Warrick unto the said Everett Stancell his heirs and assigns forever against the claims of any person or persons whatsoever shall and will warrant & forever defend a clear & indisputable right and title to the said land In witness whereof I the said John Warrick, Thomas Warrick & Job Warrick Wilie Warrick have hereunto set our hands and seals the day & date above written.

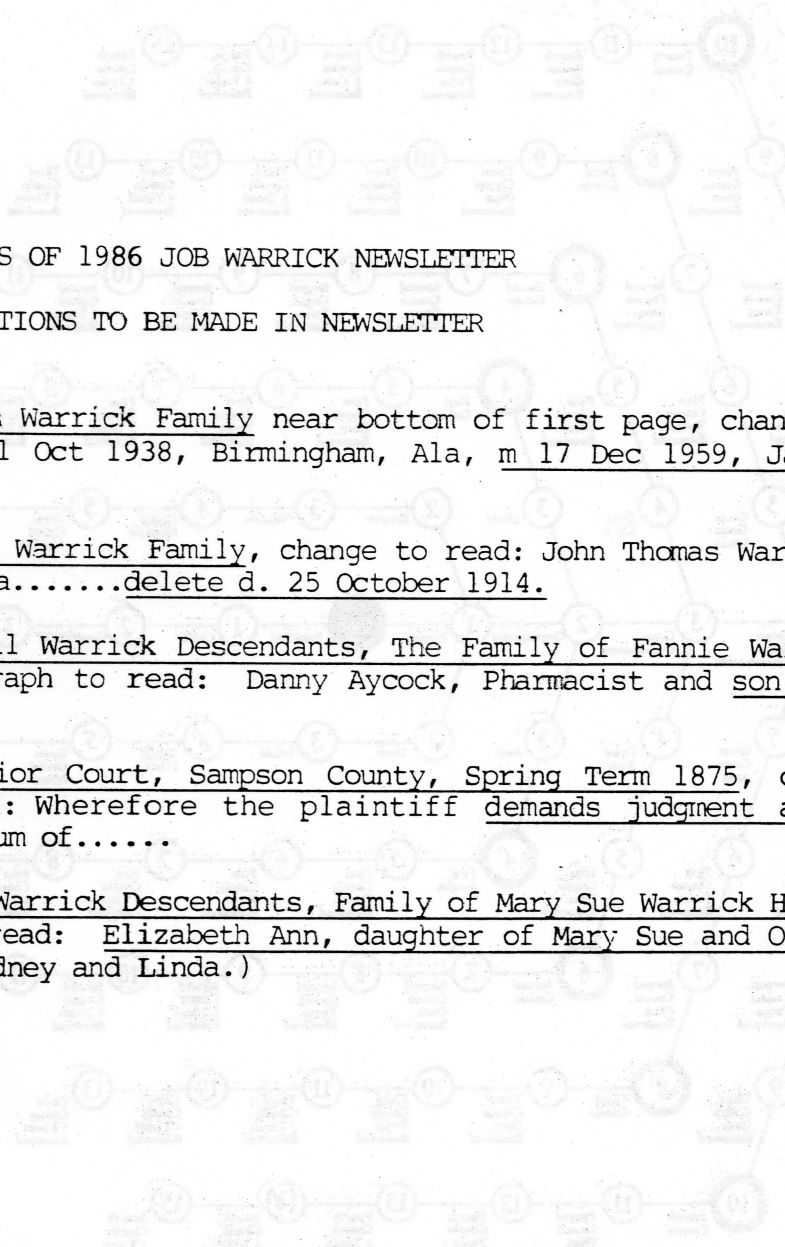

Diagram of kindred according to the law

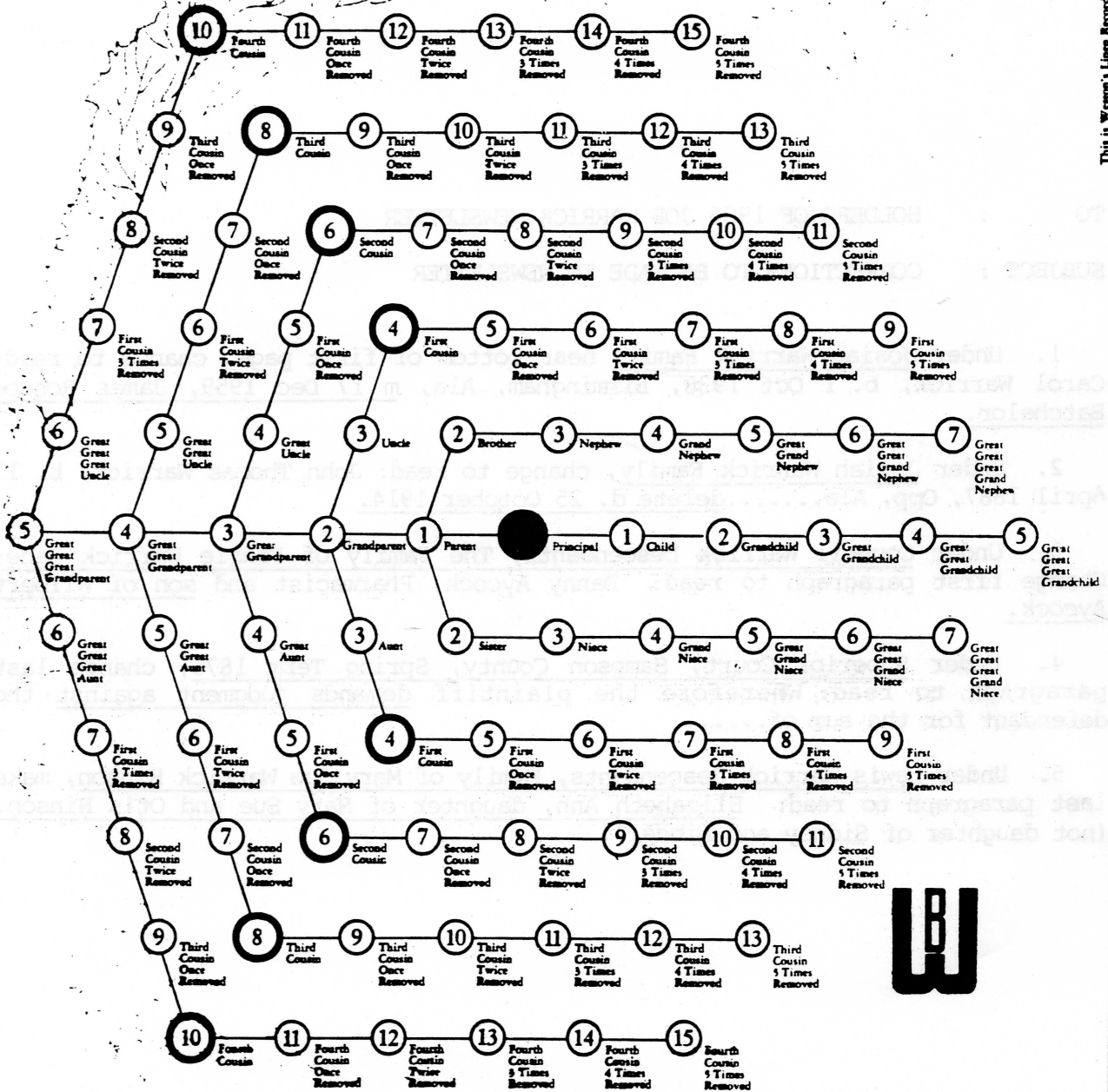
