A TELEPHONE CALL FROM MARY WARRICK TO

This past spring, Mary called me requesting that we should get a group from the Job Warrick Sr.'s ancestors and meet at her home to talk about the Trust Fund for cemetary upkeep and memorials.

A week later, Mattie Braswell, Jean Haddock, Pete and Leta Goulde Edwards, Morris and Dorothy Warrick visited with her at her home located at 3308 Rosebud Lane, Raleigh, NC 27607. Mary, due to her health and at Woodley's request, desired to set up a Trust Committee to invest and handle funds. It was agreed by those present that Pete Edwards, Jean Haddock, and Morris Warrick be on this Trust Committee and that it would take at least two signatures of the three persons to remove or spend any of the money and only the interest could be spent as needed, and if any of the above deceased or requested to be removed, another replacement would have to be named. Of the Warrick Reunion officers, active president and past president should be notified of any action to change. One thousand dollars should be kept in account at all times.

Note: Alan Lane was invited to this meeting but due to other prior plans could not attend but would go along with the decisions of this Committee.

By this time we had gone over the visitation time allowed Mary which consisted of 15 minute intervals from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily. Mary is such a fine person and is still beautiful in appearance and spirit. As a love gift, Mary at this time, gave all the old newsletters to this Committee. HISTORY OF JOB WARRICK, SR. MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

The Job Warrick, Sr. Memorial Committee (21 people) met on Sunday, November 11, 1984, at the Copper Kettle Restaurant, MGN Regency Motel, Goldsboro, North Carolina.

After a good lunch, Woodley C. Warrick, Acting-Chairman, called the meeting to order. Each person was asked to give his relationship to Job Warrick, Sr. and to relate some of his personal family history.

The next item of business was the election of officers. Elected were: Chairman, Woodley C. Warrick; Vice-Chairman, L.E. (Les) Warrick, Jr.; Secretary-Treasurer, Mary W. Warrick.

The Chairman stated the main purpose of the meeting was to discuss placing a memorial at the grave of Job Warrick, Sr. as well as the maintenance of the graveyard. One option discussed was to have the remains moved to Falling Creek Baptist Church cemetery at Grantham with an appropriate marker. It was concluded that we should know more about the cost of moving the grave as well as the practicability of doing so. Also, we needed to know the thinking of the Brown family relatives on moving the grave. Most of the people buried in the Job Warrick, Sr. homeplace cemetery were relatives of Job Warrick, Sr.'s third wife, Clarsey Brown Warrick. Another option was to place a memorial of reasonable size at the grave and a smaller marker in the Warrick plot at Falling Creek Baptist Church cemetery. A perpetual care fund was also discussed.

The Committee gave an unfavorable report on moving the Job Warrick grave, and it was decided to place a large stone at the family cemetery on the old farm S.R. 1203. The smaller stone which states the location of the grave of Job Warrick, Sr. was placed at the Falling Creek Baptist Church at Grantham, NC, on the George Warrick plot. Those in attendance when the stones were placed were: Woodley Warrick, George Warrick, and Leslie Warrick. Inscription on the large stone is as follows:

JOB WARRICK
BORN IN VIRGINIA
NOV. 18, 1798 - DEC. 13, 1879
SON OF BENJAMIN AND SALLY WARRICK
HUSBAND OF NANCY, SALLY AND CLARSEY BROWN
FATHER OF SEVENTEEN CHILDREN, WITH SIX
SONS TO SERVE IN THE CIVIL WAR

Inscription on the smaller stone is as follows:

JOB WARRICK
NOV. 18, 1798
DEC. 13, 1879
BURIED 1 MILE NW

MINUTES OF JOB WARRICK, SR. MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

Three people were selected: Les Warrick, Morris Warrick and Woodley Warrick to investigate the above suggestion and to make a proposal to the members of this committee. Meeting adjourned.

On 17 December 1984, letters were mailed to the Job Warrick, Sr. Memorial Committee from Woodley Warrick, Chairman. He stated that Les Warrick, Morris Warrick and Woodley Warrick had made their study as requested. They reported (1) it is impractical to move a grave this old, (2) that maintaining the cemetery or preventing encroachment by their plow cannot be guaranteed even though N.C. law states that such is illegal, (3) that a fund be set up with trustee being replaced as necessary is the surest way to proceed in maintaining the graveyard, and (4) that a marker be placed in the Warrick plot at Falling Creek Baptist Church.

Based on the above finding, they proposed: 1. A suitable memorial (minimum cost about \$400.00) be placed at the present grave. 2. Marker be placed at Falling Creek Church graveyard. 3. Committee members contact their relatives and inform them of the project so they might have the privilege of contributing. 4. Contributions received from Warrick descendants would be spent on the Memorial and the balance remaining to be placed in Perpetual Care Fund with trustee to be appointed and being replaced as necessary.

On 1 August 1985, they selected and placed an order with McLamb Monument Co., P.O. Box 143, Goldsboro, N.C. for the Job Warrick, Sr. Memorial, at a cost of \$438.90. Total contributions received for the Memorial Fund as of 10 August 1985 is \$1,020.00. Those who would like to contribute to this project but have not been contacted and had the privilege of doing so, may mail your contribution to Woodley C.
